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## Library Friends Offer Various Memberships

The membership of the Friends of the Library unanimously concurred with the recommendation of the director, at their meeting last Wednesday in the Junior High, to enlarge their range of annual dues to include a contributing membership at \$10.00 a year; sustaining membership at \$25.00 a year; patron at \$25.00; and life membership at \$1,000.
