Donates \$200,000 for Educational Wing at North Congregational

A gift of more than \$200,000 has been given by Russell A. Shields to the North Congregational Church, Northwestern Highway at Lahser Rd., to build an educational wing in memory of his son, Russell Jr., who was killed in the airplane accident over Grand Canyon almost three years ago.

It is the third wing to be built since North Church moved in the fall of 1955 to its new home from Blaine and Woodward. The sanctuary was built first, and was followed a year later by the Mabel P. Long Fellowship Hall, the gift of Thomas G. Long in memory of his wife.

Shields Sr., who lives at 4570 W. Outer Drive, Detroit, is one of Detroit's outstanding real estate men. He is a graduate engineer of the University of Michigan and a member of the Detroit Community No. 1. He has given distinguished service to North Church for many years. Shields was instrumental in securing for the church the 36 acres of land on Northwestern Highway. He has served on the Board of Trustees for many years and is now the church's treasurer. Last year North Church honored him at a testimonial dinner, at which they presented him with a plaque commending him for his great vision in purchasing the land, thus making possible the present site of North Congregational Church.

Russell Shields, Jr., was a brilliant and promising young scientist who was associated with Bell Telephone Corporation. He was returning from a business trip for his company when the fatal accident occurred. He was an active leader in the young people's work and a member of the board of elders.
