A Regular Meeting of the Farmington Township Board was held on Monday, May 18, 1959 at 8:07 P.M. by Mr. Carl Hall, Chairman. Members present were: Mr. Carl Hall, Chairman; Mr. Avery, Brown, Hug and Wilcox; Bassette absent. Mr. Joseph T. Brennan, Township At-Large, was present.

Minutes of meeting held on April 28th, 1959, read by Clerk. Corrected showing two days should be shown on Motion covering water of filling fee on Final Plat of Franklin Villa No. 4 Subdivision. With correction the Minutes stand approved as read.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Avery, that we authorize Mr. Brennan, with the approval of the Township Board, to call in a man with experience in Township Zoning whenever deemed necessary.

MOTION withdrawn.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Avery, that Final Plat of Westbrook Manor No. 3 Subdivision, of the NW 1/4 and part of W 1/4 of the NE 1/4 Sec. 16, be given final approval, subject to Oakland County Road Commission and Health Department. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Brown, supported by Cairns, that the Planning Board be requested to make suggestions covering question of controlling domestic animals within the Township. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Cairns, that we act in accordance with the Health Officer's recommendations, and with condemnation proceedings on 21723 Roosevelt and 21701 Tulane. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Avery, that we accept the resignation of Mr. Hugh S. Fisher as Director of Public Safety, and that the Clerk be authorized to write a letter of appreciation to Mr. Fisher for the many hours he spent in his behalf. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Hug, supported by Wilcox, that the Township policeman be authorized to spend up to \$500.00 a year for the cleaning of uniforms. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Brown, supported by Hug, that request of Franklin Knolls be granted and waive any interest on Special Assessments promptly made for the year 1959 with reference to Franklin Knolls Special Assessment. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Hug, that the Treasurer be authorized to invest funds in the Franklin Knolls Special Assessment Fund in U.S. Treasury Notes. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Brown, supported by Wilcox, that the Supervisor and Clerk of the Township be authorized to enter into the Agreement with the Village of Quakertown covering building inspection. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Brown, supported by Avery, that the Clerk be authorized to draw up specifications and accept bids for fire engine. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Hug, that we pay bills No. 8978 through No. 9046 in June and No. 297 through 214 inclusive. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Hug, that we pay bills No. 8775 and No. 8774. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Cairns, that we authorize the Township Supervisor to take over the duties vacated by the Director of Public Safety, subject to the overall control of the Township Board. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Cairns, that the Supervisor be authorized to accept or reject a bid the Board may decide after a special meeting with the Board.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Hug, that we appoint three members of the Board to bid for police cars and make recommendation thereon to Board. Carried - unanimous.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Avery, to adjourn meeting at 9:50 P.M. Carried - unanimous.
