Rev. Walters At Baptist Meet in Iowa
Among the estimated 10,000 delegates and visitors at the 52nd annual meeting of the American Baptist Convention, June 4-9, in Des Moines, Iowa, was Rev. Melvin R. Walters, pastor of the North Farmington Baptist Church, and his wife.
Robbing shoulders with state and national delegates in Des Moines were fraternal delegates and visitors from Canada and overseas countries where American Baptists have mission work.
A feature of the annual convention this year was a college commencement at which representative graduates of two schools related to the American Baptist Convention receiving their degrees, Sunday, June 7. The schools were St. Louis College, Sioux Falls, South Dakota and Central Baptist Theological Seminary, Kansas City, Mo. The convention also spotlighted the denomination's current "Christian Higher Education Challenge," a campaign to raise \$75 million for Christian education, seminaries, campus ministries, and scholarships.
Beginning in 1959, the American Baptist Convention is taking part in a five-year cooperative evangelistic effort with the other five major Baptist groups in the United States and Canada. This "Baptist Division of Radio and Television of the American Baptist Convention" will be a dramatic demonstration of the denomination's opening session in a presentation produced by the Department of Radio and Television of the American Baptist Convention.
Displays and addresses on American Baptist mission work around the world played a prominent part in the convention program. Major addresses were given by missionaries from the Department of Radio and Television, as well as reports from the administrative officers of both home and overseas missions.
A colorful service dedicated to the new missionaries, Sunday June 7, was one of the convention highlights. A business session presided over by Mrs. Maurice B. Hodge, Portland, Ore., convention president. Major business items included election of a new general secretary, post executive post in the denomination; hearing of reorganization proposals and election of 1959-1960 officers.
The American Baptist Church has churches in 37 states including Alaska and Hawaii, plus Washington, D.C., and Puerto Rico. Current membership is an estimated 1 1/2 million.

Christian Science Head Selected
Mrs. Kathryn F. Cook of Boston was named president of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts.
A native of South Bend, Indiana, she has devoted her entire time to the practice of Christian Science. Her husband was George Shaw Cook, a former Christian Science Lecturer, teacher, and editor, he served as President of The Mother Church, just twenty years ago.
Mrs. Cook's appointment was announced by The Christian Science Board of Directors at the Annual Meeting of The Mother Church, she succeeds Leonard T. Carney, a member of the Board of Trustees of The Christian Science Publishing Society. Mrs. Cook will serve a one-year term.
Active in various capacities in the Christian Science movement in the office of the Committee on Publication for Indiana in 1924. Since that time she has been almost continuously engaged in some phase of Christian Science work.
