Wants Annexation Made Tougher

The following is the text of a letter sent to Harvey Lodge, Senator 12th District, Capitol Building, Lansing, Michigan, and also to James Clarkson, Representative Oakland County 4th District, Capitol Building, Lansing, Michigan, who is also a Farmington neighbor to flood Lansing with letters.

Dear Senator Lodge:

Although you are busy with a great many problems many of them in Lansing, I hope you won't mind hearing from a constituent who is a proponent of self determination for our communities. There are quite a few of us here in Farmington Township and we are a bit over-troverish about it. The new law giving townships more power is a step in the right direction.

But there is also a positively filthy proposal now before the Legislature. This is a bill to amend the Charter of the Township of Farmington, Michigan, which would permit a city to petition in court for an annexation order without a vote by the citizens in the territory proposed to be annexed.

Unless a lot of people take time to wear out shoe leather to get petitions signed. We wear out a lot of shoe leather here in Farmington Township, but we like to spend as much of this time as possible on constructive programs instead of fighting off the highway, crowd-out, commercializing and general effacement attempts of developers. Annexation should be made tougher instead of easier.

May I offer the thought that this is America and that here in America we ought not to be subjected to more and more laws which take away from a vote on important matters. But that's what we've been getting from Lansing.

Admittedly there are more ways to conduct a government than to have such votes. In fact, the most efficient form of government is the dictatorship and the least efficient is democracy. But I have the impression that here in America we had long ago resolved to pay the additional cost of the inefficiency of democracy. I just wish that somebody would take the floor in Lansing and argue forcibly for our American heritage.
