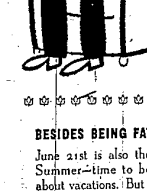

The new facilities which are now under construction will add 100 luxury rooms (a total of 250 square feet) to the existing Inn. Architectural lines follow the same traditional pattern with a longer upper and lower veranda extending the full length of the Inn, the new addition being adjoining and directly accessible to the Inn proper.

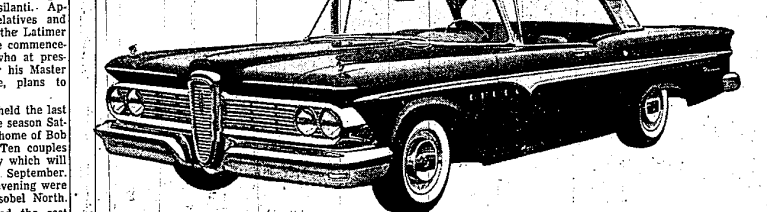
