Northville Downs Set for 16th Big Harness Racing Season

Northville's 16th season will begin Monday, June 22, immediately following the meet at Hazel Park which closes June 20.

The 26-day meeting will go through August 1.

Northville will get off to a sizzling start with the \$10,000 added HTA Pace to be held June 27, the first Saturday.

It is one of several early closing events at Michigan's premier harness racing paragon plant.

Seldom does a track open the campaign with such a rich prize but this is the story at Northville Downs and to add a bit of icing to the cake, it will have the same horses back a week later, Friday, July 3, for the \$5,000 Invitational HTA Pace.

Executive Manager John J. Carlo is looking forward to a season that will be equal to or better than that of a year ago when Northville showed a 75 percent hike in attendance, with an average of 5,000 although there was a slight 2 percent dip in the handle with an average of \$212,107.

The attendance increase at Northville was surprising since the State was in the throes of a recession during most of the 1958 racing season.

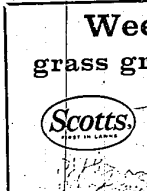
