GARDEN LULL. Farmington gardens have developed a summer lullness in the past few weeks. Tree leaves have grown to mature size and are a rich, deep green. Perennial foliage has grown so that plants are spilling over their allotted spaces and creating an intermingling of shades and textures.

In some gardens there is a temporary lull. The perennial display is slowing down and annuals are not yet at their peak. Other gardens are gay with tall blue, spikes of delphinium, white and flame colored lilies, and bright flowered cornflowers and sweet william. If color is lacking in your garden now, make a note of what is in bloom in other gardens

Sometimes the hinges on doors become so worn that the screws won't hold any longer. There are several remedies for this. You can try using longer screws. Or you can plug the screw holes with wood shavings dipped in glue, and reset your screws in these. Or, you can fill the holes with solid wood and reset your screws in this. Or instead of using solid wood you can stuff the enlarged screw holes with bits of steel wool.

There are numerous brands of pesticides available. When purchasing them check the label to be sure that they contain the ingredients wanted. The chemicals can be purchased separately, but it is more convenient to use commercially prepared mixtures that combine several ingredients for greater effectiveness. Be sure to follow directions carefully, and cover both under and upper leaf surfaces. Observe all caution.

REMEMBERS All vegetable and flower plants should be set out now. Continue planting beans, peas, squash, corn, and seeds of other tender vegetables if it has not yet been done. If vegetable garden space is limited train tomatoes to grow upright on a stake and prune off side branches, leaving a strong central stem.

Make another planting of gladioli for a succession of bloom.

Plant dahlia tubers and set stake for them at the same time.

Plant seeds of annual poppies, annual poppies, and African daisies to fill in bare spots in the garden.
