Thinking About A Swimming Pool? - Take Precautions

Backyard swimming pools can become sources of illness and injury if not built and operated properly, the Michigan Department of Health warns.

Before entering into a purchase agreement, prospective buyers should have plans for their pool checked by local government and health officials, the state health dept. urged. Checking in advance will ensure that the pool conforms with local ordinances and won't endanger health.

The following pointers on construction and operation of private pools are recommended by the state health department:

- 1—At the start of each swimming season, drain all water and scrub down the pool sides with chlorine water and a stiff brush. Rinse with fresh water.
- 2—Make sure the pool sides and bottom are watertight so pool won't leak out and ground water won't seep in.
- 3—Fill the pool with water safe to drink. Don't use raw lake or stream water.
- 4—Equip the pool with an automatic pump and filter. Use continuously.
- 5—Add chlorine to the water with a mechanical feed pump. A pump is more effective than merely adding the chemical by hand. The chlorine content should be kept at five-tenths of a part of chlorine to every million parts of water. Kits for testing pool-water are available. The chlorine content can be purchased features that should be avoided.
- 6—Pool water should be kept slightly alkaline to avoid eye irritations. Water can be made alkaline by adding lime or soda ash just before the water goes through the filter.
- 7—Electrical wires shouldn't run above or near the pool.
- 8—All persons should shower before entering the pool.
- 9—Just before going into the pool, all persons should spray their feet with germicide and dirt. Chemical foot baths aren't recommended.
- 10—Persons with colds, sore throats, skin sores and other signs of possible illness shouldn't use pool.
- 11—A fence should be placed around the pool or property to prevent youngsters, adults and stray animals from falling into the pool accidentally.
- 12—An adult swimmer should be present when children use the pool. A long pole or life preserver should be kept available for rescue use.
- 13—Water should be at least eight feet deep under diving boards.
- 14—Diving boards aren't recommended for small pools because of dangers to divers and swimmers.
- 15—Sloping sides, sharp drop-offs and steps are dangerous design features that should be avoided.

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Jr. High Level Reading Ability Varies Widely

Junior high school textbooks used in many schools are suited to the reading skills of only about 20 per cent of the students, according to a Michigan State University educational research study.

"Many junior high teachers use a single textbook in classes where the reading ability may range from the non-reader to the college-level reader," explained Dr. Elizabeth M. Drews, associate professor in foundations of education.

This wide range of ability in one class is unusual or, as it is not unexpected, she added.

"It is no more unusual for some students not to be able to read when expected than it is for their first teeth or to cut to walk at a certain age."

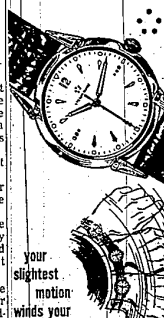
Differences in ability show up strongly at the junior high school level, Dr. Drews said, pointing out that a typical ninth grade textbook probably would be too difficult for about 40 per cent of the class and too easy for another 40 per cent, leaving it suited to only about 20 per cent of the students.

Most junior high school teachers have neither the time to prepare for nor the necessary training to teach as well at different levels within a single classroom, she added.

Another problem, according to Dr. Drews, "Cultivation of problem-solving ability and reading comprehension is generally neglected."

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Osteopathic Assn. Wants Offices Here

Permission to erect a \$100,000 administration building in the Village of Wood Creek Farms has been asked by the Michigan Association of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons.

Construction is proposed on the 13.5-acre Gable property at 13 Mile and Northwestern Highway.

In making the request for permission, before the village council Tuesday night spokesmen for the realty firm attempting to sell the property and Osteopathic association also showed floor plans and an architect's rendering for the proposed Dutch Colonial building.

It was pointed out in discussion that no commercial activities would be conducted from the building since the association is a non-profit organization. The building would be used exclusively by the association's executive secretary and a staff of five or six employees. It was emphasized.

The proposal is to locate the building on the bluff setting back from Northwestern Highway. The Gable home fronting on 13 Mile would be used by the executive secretary and his family as a place of residence.

Although Wood Creek is zoned entirely residential, provisions are included permitting churches, community buildings and buildings for use by non-profit organizations, a planning commission official stated.

The attorney for the Osteopathic association said that assurances could be given the village that the building would not be sold later for use by commercial enterprises.

The request was referred to the planning commission for its study and recommendations.
