Several Hear Noted Jehovah's Witness Speak

"Looking at matters from a perfectly natural standpoint, informed men and women have become convinced that peace among nations is an absolute necessity," stated Mr. N. H. Knorr, president of the governing body of the world-wide organization of Jehovah's Witnesses as he spoke to a capacity crowd of 12,317 at the L.M.A. Auditorium in Flint last Sunday. This was the conclusion of a four-day Jehovah's Witness assembly here.
More than 250 delegates from this area were part of the audience gathered from 22 states and three provinces of Canada which overflowed the auditorium facilities into tents hastily erected in all available parking area surrounding the building.
Mr. Ernest Salma of the local delegation said that President Knorr is considered an international authority on the relationship between world events and fulfill Bible prophecy and his subject, "When God Speaks Peace to All Nations," was authoritative and well documented.
Mr. Salma stated that the local delegates received much information in other sessions of the assembly which could be used advantageously in their education and training programs and which will result in much benefit to people of the community.
Mr. Salma also reported that 337 new ministers were ordained in a mass public baptism ceremony during the meet.

Signs Reduce Accident Tolls

Accidents were reduced from 12 to 15, injuries from 37 to 9, and fatalities from 1 to none after the Highway Department completed re-signaling operations at six locations on Michigan turnpikes, Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie announced.
Before and after studies were made for one and two-year periods at these locations—in St. Joseph, Jackson, Jackson, Lansing, and Muskegon counties—the Department's Traffic Division.
In St. Joseph county oversize vehicle markers and reflection signals at the intersection of M 103 and M 112 cut accidents from 6 to 2, injuries rose from 1 to 2, and the accident rate per million vehicles fell from 3.6 to 1.1.
Curve signs mounted on lattice backgrounds at two locations on old U.S.—26 at Michigan Ave. and the other 0.2 of a mile west of Michigan Ave.—in Jackson county, cut accidents from 16 to 1, injuries from 7 to 4, fatalities from 3 to none, and the accident rate per million vehicles from 8.6 to 3.5.
In Leelanau county, at the intersection of M 72 and the south junction with County Road 669, accidents were cut from 7 to 3, injuries from 6 to 2, and the accident rate per million vehicles from 30.7 to 12.6 after the intersection was completely redesigned with extra large turn signals, route and speed signs.
At the intersection of M 90 and M 53 in Lapeer county, accidents were reduced from 5 to 1, injuries from 4 to 1, and the accident rate per million vehicle from 4.7 to 0.9 after a "Stop Ahead" sign on a lattice background was installed.
