GARDENING

BLUEBELLS or campanula have been treasured garden plants for centuries. They make an outstanding display in late June and early July when they produce two to one half to three or four heavy stalks laden with campanula is a diminutive of the Italian word for bell and refers to the shape of the corolla.

Although all members of the Campanulaceae family have similar flowers, their habits of growth vary greatly. Some are tiny, with leaves that hug the ground and a flower stalk only a few inches in height.

Campanula rotundifolia, the family's most familiar member, grows about a foot tall. From June to August pendant blue bells line the stem. This species grows in either sun or light shade.

THE PEACH-BELL bluebell, Campanula persicifolia, has two to three foot spikes of bright blue, soft lavender-blue, or white flowers. It is a lovely garden plant and a superb cut flower.

Platycodon, or balloon flowers, are also members of the bluebell family. The three to four foot spikes are studded with buds that pull up like small balloons before opening into the typical bell shape. They are hardy, disease resistant perennials that produce their blue, or occasionally pink or white, blossoms throughout the summer.
