A severe drought in the major nesting areas of Canada and the two Dakotas has painted a somber duck hunting picture for this fall.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service states the drought has dried up 50-80 per cent of the potholes around which millions of ducks gather annually to nest and hatch their young.

Approximately 60-70 per cent of North America's ducks are produced in the prairie provinces of Canada. The Mississippi Flyway in which Michigan is included, relies on these provinces for most of its duck population.
