ADVERTISEMENT FOR BIDS.
The Board of Education of Farmington Public Schools of Farmington and Wayne Counties, Michigan, will receive sealed bids for the construction of the new Farmington Elementary School on Louise and Pembroke Avenues, Farmington, Michigan, at 10:00 a.m., E.S.T., Thursday, July 23, 1959, at the office of the Board of Education, 20210 Middlebelt Road, Farmington, Michigan, at which time and place all bids will be publicly opened and read aloud.
Separate proposals will be received as follows:
- BASE BID - GENERAL CONSTRUCTION including work of all trades.
- PROPOSALS must be on forms furnished by the architect and be accompanied by a bid bond or certified check in the amount of five percent (5%) of the proposed sum.
- Plans and specifications may be obtained on and after Thursday, July 9, 1959, at the office of the architect, Fargnoli & MacMahon, Architects, 1591 Woodward Avenue, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan.
- A check in the sum of \$10.00 must be submitted as a deposit for each set of plans and specifications, same to be refunded upon return of plans and specifications in good condition within ten (10) days of the opening of bids.
- Accepted bidders will be required to furnish satisfactory performance bond and labor and material bond, each in the amount of 100% of the contract price, the cost of which shall be paid by the accepted bidder.
- All proposals shall remain firm for a period of thirty (30) days after official opening of bids.
- The Board of Education reserves the right to reject any and all bids and to waive any informalities therein.

ence for property damage, such policy shall be endorsed to provide that it shall not be cancelled by the insurance company without ten days written notice to the Township. If such policy is cancelled, the license granted hereunder shall terminate automatically with such insurance.
SECTION 5.
Licenses hereunder shall be issued for a term of one year, unless the Board of Education may be renewed in the same manner as originally granted.
SECTION 6.
A fee of \$250 shall be paid at the time of application to defray the expense of enforcing this ordinance.
SECTION 7.
All premises licensed hereunder shall be equipped with the following safety precautions in a condition precedent to the issuance of such license:
A. A six foot chain-link fence or other fence of equal quality, approved by the Supervisor, shall be constructed around the entire area from which material is or has been taken, it being the intent of this provision to require fencing of all excavations, whether or not such excavations are presently being worked.
B. If such premises lie on a public highway, the same shall be kept securely locked at all times when operations shall be being carried on. When such gates are not locked, they shall be equipped with proper gates, which shall be kept securely locked at all times when operations shall be being carried on.
C. No water shall be allowed to stand in any excavation unless such is fed by springs or other natural means, and the surface water shall be carried off.
D. No children shall be allowed within such fence at any time.
E. No swimming shall be permitted in any such pit or excavation at any time.
F. All trucks used in hauling gravel, sand, or other minerals from the property, shall use such routes to and from the property as shall be approved by the Supervisor, subject to the review of the Township Board.
No explosives of any kind shall be used in mining any gravel, sand, or other minerals, except upon the express approval of the Township Board. If used, such explosives shall be used in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Bureau of Mines, and the use of such explosives shall be used exclusively for the purpose of excavating.
H. No excavating shall be done so close to any adjoining property line as to endanger the lateral support for such property, and in no event shall excavating be done within fifty (50) feet of any adjoining property line.
I. All machinery used in such operations shall be maintained in proper condition, mechanically and otherwise. Machines powered with diesel or gasoline engines shall be equipped with mufflers, as much as reasonably possible, to reduce noise and nuisance factors.
J. No operations shall be carried on later than 6 P.M. in the evening, nor shall any operations begin earlier than 7 A.M. in the morning, nor shall any operations be carried on on Sunday.
SECTION 8.
The Supervisor, or any other authorized agent of the Township, or any member of the Township Police Department, shall have the right to enter the premises used under such license at any reasonable time.
The word "excavation" as used in this Ordinance, shall include holes, pits, diggings, or other cavities in the surface of the earth, and shall also include operations for the removal of gravel, sand, or other mineral by means of leveling hills or other high portions of land.
SECTION 10.
Violation of this Ordinance shall be a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding \$100 or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not exceeding 30 days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the County Jail for each day that a violation under this Ordinance is allowed to continue, after notice to the violator, shall be considered a separate violation of the Ordinance.
SECTION 11.
The provisions of this Ordinance are separable and any provision which is held to be invalid shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the Ordinance.
SECTION 12.
Gravel pits, sand pits, or other excavations covered by this Ordinance and in existence on the effective date hereof shall be allowed a period of thirty (30) days after such effective date to conform to the provisions hereof and apply for a license hereunder.
SECTION 13.
This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after its first publication in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan, on the 23rd day of July, 1959.

Local Teacher One of 18 at Museum Resources Workshop

The effective use of museum resources, with emphasis on science, natural history and social studies, was the subject of a two-week workshop attended by 18 southeastern Michigan teachers at the Cranbrook Institute of Science this summer. Nina Orr of 25453 Springbrook, Farmington, was one of these teachers.

The workshop emphasized science, natural history and social studies in an effort to acquaint elementary and secondary teachers with museums and other community resources which will provide broader educational experiences.

Guiding the workshop sessions were two outstanding educators: James A. Fowler, curator of education for the Cranbrook Institute of Science, and Dr. Ted Ward, coordinator of the Farmington Teacher Center for Michigan State University.

Mr. Fowler recently came to Farmington from his post as a teacher of education at the Philadelphia Academy of Natural Sciences. He has traveled widely as a lecturer, panelist and resource person in the fields of science and museum education. Dr. Ward is a specialist in the fields of curriculum development and the utilization of audio-visual resources in teaching.

While at the two-week workshop, the teachers became more familiar with museum resources through a series of activities. Included were "behind-the-scenes" tours of work rooms, interpretations of exhibits, preparation of materials and displays, integration of museum resources into curricular planning for the classroom, techniques of developing "classroom museums," a planetarium demonstration, nature walks and museum education films.

Lecture-demonstrations also introduced the teachers to studies as birds, rocks and anthropology. Participants were then expected as final assignments to develop projects based upon their own teaching field and level.

Commenting on the value of this workshop to teachers, Dr. Ward said, "We are fortunate to have a facility of the magnitude of the Cranbrook Institute of Science at which to hold this workshop."

"Community resources, such as museums, are rich in instructional value if the teacher will only become acquainted with them and learn the techniques for using them."

"This is another effective way of moving the classroom into the community."

Forest Park Buyers Get Pool Use With Purchase

A subdivision recreational center was officially opened in Forest Brook, 330 new homes developed at the southwest corner of Inkster and Nine Mile Roads.

Composed of a swimming pool, children's sprinkle pool, bath house and badminton, volleyball and horseshoe courts, the Forest Park Athletic Club was opened last week free of charge to families buying homes in Forest Brook use through the remainder of this summer.

"GENERALLY," swimming pool and recreational facilities are developed after a community has been built," said Z. Broad, president of Kaufman and Broad, developers and builders.

"By completing and making the recreational area available to home buyers before we complete construction on their homes, future residents and their families can inspect the progress of their homes on weekends and at the same time enjoy private recreational facilities simply by presenting their membership cards."

Plans call for the athletic club to eventually come under the supervision and direction of an elected group of home owners.

The pool boasts diving board facilities and special underwater lighting, permitting night swimming for adults. To insure safety at all times, the pool is fenced and ample area is provided around its outer edge for sunning and play.

A sand volleyball court permits participants from the swimming area to play barefooted.

Constructed at a cost of \$50,000, the athletic club has been donated to the subdivision by the builders of the 3 and 4-bedroom homes in the \$14,500 to \$17,000 price range. The club is under the registered life guard supervision of a former Great Lakes Naval Base and YMCA swimming instructor, Edward C. Compton.

Compton will supervise a complete "learn to swim" program in addition to organizing aquatic events such as diving, relays and water carnivals.

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR SAFETY AND HEALTH PRECAUTIONS ON GRAVEL OR SAND PITS AND OTHER EXCAVATIONS HEREINFOR, OR EXISTING IN FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP, TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF A LICENSE FOR SUCH OPERATION; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF THE ENFORCEMENT OF THE VIOLATION HEREOF.

By the authority granted to the Township of Farmington by Act No. 246 of the Public Acts of 1929, as amended, the TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

SECTION 1.
After the effective date of this Ordinance, no person, firm, corporation, partnership, or other legal entity, shall operate, maintain, or allow to exist upon, or property, gravel pit, sand pit, or other excavation, presently or previously used for the taking of any mineral from the ground, unless such operation or premises is duly licensed as required by this Ordinance.

SECTION 2.
Application for licenses under this Ordinance shall be made to the Township Clerk. The application shall contain the name and address of the owner of the property; the name and address of the one conducting the operations thereon; a detailed description and topographical map of the property involved, including an estimate of the gravel, sand, or other mineral being removed which still remains on the property, signed by a registered professional engineer or land surveyor; and an express agreement to conform to the requirements of this Ordinance.

SECTION 3.
No license to operate any such gravel pit, sand pit, or other excavation shall be granted if the operation of such pit or excavation would be a violation of the Zoning Ordinance of Farmington Township, being specifically provided hereby that this Ordinance is subject to the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance.

SECTION 4.
All applications for licenses hereunder shall be submitted to the Township Board and shall be considered at a regular meeting thereof. A license granted by such Board, shall become effective when the licensee shall deposit with the Township Clerk the following:

A. A surety bond in the principal amount of \$50,000 running to the Township in accordance with the statute, issued by a corporate surety company licensed to do business in the State of Michigan and conditioned upon the licensee conforming to all of the requirements of this Ordinance, and

B. An original policy of liability insurance covering the licensee for the operations permitted by such license in limits of \$50,000 to \$100,000, one person, per occurrence, per bodily injury, and \$50,000 per occurrence

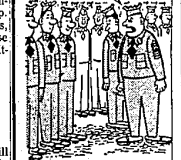
Get Peak at College Life
