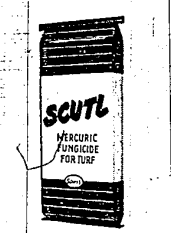

Interior roads. ROUTES of ingress and egress from Grand River to this business area parking lots are called for between Homestead House and Farmington Dairy and at another point eastward where the Lloyd Gullen building is now located.

On the south side of Grand River behind the stores fronting on it, the plan calls for the purchase of four or five parcels of land including buildings between Thomas and Oakland to provide off-street parking there. A roadway from Grand River to the parking area is specified where the old Eike Temple building stands.

On the south side of Grand River west of Farmington Road, the plan calls for the rating of the DPW building fronting on State Street and one or two other buildings to the west. This would also be converted into parking area and be connected to the present municipal parking lot between Farmington Road and Liberty Street off Grand River.

IT WAS ESTIMATED that approximately \$75,000 would be needed to purchase the 13 pieces of privately owned land as well as paying off money still due on the city owned land called for in this plan. Another \$100,000 was figured for clearing and blacktopping the parking lots.

The proposal is that this work be financed through the establishment of a downtown district. It is expected that the merchants with land reasonably near the parking areas to benefit most would be assessed at a yearly rate of \$10 per front foot for a ten year period. Those more distant, deriving lesser benefits, would be assessed at rates 50 to 70 percent lower. It was stated that two or three prominent businessmen, not involved in the planning, had already been contacted and were strongly in favor of it.

**Start on New Courthouse Again Delayed**

Legal entanglements in getting a new court house built for Oakland County, starting in 1957, began anew recently. Just when it appeared that the construction could be started following the awarding of the construction contract, a tax payer's suit to force the county to award the contract to the new bidder, A. Z. Shmina & Sons Co. of Dearborn, was filed.

The suit on behalf of Frank Hargis, Jr., 3022 Ferris Royal Oak, contended the county should not have awarded the contract to the J. A. Fredman & Sons Co. of Pontiac because their bid was slightly higher than the Shmina & Sons Co. bid. Scrugg's brother, William, works for the Shmina & Sons firm.

The county's argument was that it was not required to let the contract to the lowest bidder and decided to give it to the Fredman Co. since it was the county's choice.

The suit was thrown out of Oakland County Circuit Court last week it was indicated by a visit from distance to the State Supreme Court.

In view of an anticipated long delay, the Fredman Co. has withdrawn its bid. Delos, chairman of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, disclosed Monday.

As a result of this action, it is expected that the appeal to the State Supreme Court will be withdrawn also. If it is, the county will re-advertise for second bids. Hamlin stated.

It was a taxpayer's suit in 1957, questioning the legality of the manner in which the county collected the funds for the new courthouse, that started all the trouble. This suit was also carried all the way to the State Supreme Court.

**Few Changes In Hunting, Trapping Rules**

Hunting and trapping regulations for Michigan's 1959-60 season will remain almost the same as those in effect last year following Conservation Commission action recently.

Some minor regulations will continue on pheasant, ruffed grouse, bobcat, raccoon, rabbit, squirrel, mink and woodcock hunting. An order prohibiting fox squirrels in the upper peninsula was renewed. It will be extended for five years starting October 1.

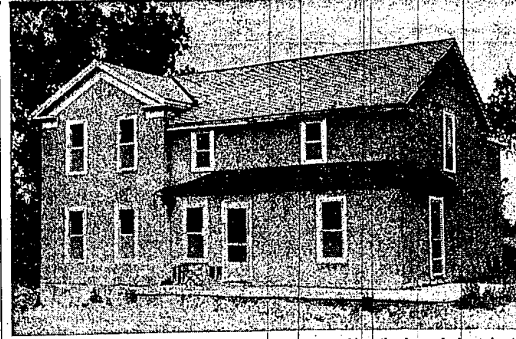
Commissioners voted to shorten the "early fall" bear season in the lower peninsula to 15 days—October 1-15. Conservation Department field men and the Michigan Bear Hunters' Association felt too many bears have been taken there in recent years.

Following legislative action, a bear stamp will be required in addition to the small game license. Bears may be hunted during early seasons on a deer license.

Sharp-tailed grouse hunting will be closed on Drummond Island and in the lower peninsula's spring breeding population to higher production. Last year's regulations on these birds are unchanged elsewhere in the state.

Hungarian partridges may be hunted in Chippewa county from October 1-15. "Hungarians" have increased sufficiently since being introduced there in 1954 to warrant the short experimental season. Bag limits will be two in possession and eight per season.

Hunting regulations for deer and waterfowl seasons will be set next month.

**Offers New Bill Against Obscenity**

Another weapon to guard the Nation's children from mail order in obscenity has been sponsored by Congressman William S. Broomfield (R-Oakland County).

In a bill introduced in the House of Representatives, Broomfield proposed that the Postmaster General be given power to detain mail for up to 30 days if such action is "in the public interest."

Newspapers and magazines under the mails would be exempt. Last year, Broomfield supported a bill which was passed into law. It gave the Postmaster General the power to prosecute at the point of mail delivery which the Post Office Department has termed a "post office pornography."

Broomfield said that testimony by Postmaster General Arthur W. Summerfield before the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee revealed that traffic in obscene material through the mails had doubled in the past five years, and that it could double again by 1963.

"We must take active steps to stop these operators, in smuggling their obscene material, who prey on our youth," said Broomfield. "Distribution of obscene photographs and literature is a big business. This racket is operating for \$500,000,000 (Million) a year."

Between 700,000 and 1,000,000 (million) children will receive obscene pictures or literature through Broomfield's bill.

"The names of a great many of these children will be obtained through answering an innocuous-looking advertisement in a magazine or for stamps or some other item."

Broomfield urged the wholehearted cooperation of parents in fighting the racket. He said that the bill would give child first-class mailing privileges, which could not be opened by the Post Office Department. He urged all who receive such mail to immediately so that an investigation can be started.

"The Post Office Department has been remarkably slow in removing as many of these pornography peddlars as possible and bringing them to court," said Broomfield.

endanger lateral support, or within 50 feet of adjoining property.

IT IS SPECIFIED that the ordinance shall cover not only below ground-level excavation but removal of material by leveling hills or other high places of land as well.

The right to inspect pit operations at any reasonable time and to require the excavation of their agents or other provision of the ordinance.

Violation of any provisions of the ordinance shall result in a fine not to exceed \$100 or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days or both. Each day that a violation exists after notice has been given will be considered a separate violation.

The effective date of the ordinance is August 23, 1959.
