Chaplain For Air Force 403rd Carrier Wing

Fifteen hundred airmen and officers from Detroit, Chicago and Muskegon, Oklahoma, are conducting summer maneuvers with the 403rd Troop Carrier Wing at Bakalar Air Force Base, Columbus, Indiana. Chaplain to the wing is Captain A. Karl Boehmke, local pastor of Shepherd Park Lutheran Church at West Maple and Middlebelt Roads.

TROOPS were airtight in C-119 aircraft of the 403rd Troop Carrier Wing from its three operational squadrons located at Selfridge AFB, Mc Clellens, Or Harre AFB, Chicago, and Davis AFB, Muskegon. Conducting regular religious services is part of Chaplain Boehmke's ministry to the men and women in uniform. Services are held in the barracks type chapel building equipped with altar, pulpit, pews and organ. When congregations answer "church call" the services are transferred to the base theater building, where a portable altar provides the worship setting, and air conditioning equipment provides welcome relief to the Indian summer heat.

OTHER CHAPLAIN duties include counseling, lecturing in the field of moral leadership to commissioned officers, non-commissioned officers and airmen, and accompanying troops in their training projects.

The encampment got underway on August 1 and will conclude with the return of troops to their home bases on August 15.

Rev. Boehmke joined the AF Reserve as chaplain in 1950. He served on active duty during the Korean action, and since then has continued inactive training on a monthly and summer basis with the 88th Air De- velopment Wing, New York City, and the Selfridge wing. HE CAME to the Farmington area in 1956 to become founding pastor of Shepherd Park congregation. He will be installed as permanent pastor of the church at the time of dedication of the newly completed church building, the first week in November.

New Home Building In County Down; This Area Exception

While new home building activities in Wayne and Macomb counties showed upturns of more than 30 per cent for the first half of this year compared to a decrease of 15.7%, the four townships in Washtenaw showed the sharpest decline in building - 38 per cent. This is the information reported in half-year figures compiled by the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission.

THE INCREASE for the entire metropolitan area, including Monroe County and four townships in Washtenaw showed the sharpest decline in building - 38 per cent. Both Farmington city and township were exceptions in Oakland County, Bloomfield Township, broke into the top ten in the number of new home permits granted during the first six months in the Detroit metropolitan area. The township issued 239 permits, ranking it in the last spot in the top ten new building activity list.

Nankin Township in Wayne and Warren in Macomb were the top two building areas during the first half of 1959. Only ONE community is issuing 1,002 and 1,008 permits for new homes, respectively. It is important to note that southern Oakland County growth has been slowed by over-extension of its drainage facilities caused by previous rapid growth in planning commission report stated.

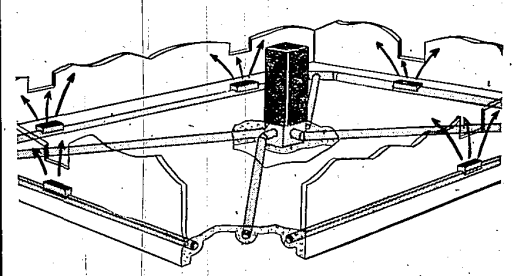
