LEGAL NOTICE

OPEN LOT STORAGE ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO REQUIRE THE FENCING OF OPEN LOT STORAGE AREAS AND TO PROVIDE FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

By the authority granted by Act No. 246 of the Public Acts of 1945, as amended, THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

SECTION 1.

From and after the effective date of this Ordinance, all premises located within the Township of Farmington and used for the open lot storage of commercial or industrial materials, equipment or supplies, including contractors' yards, shall be enclosed by a chain link or similar type fence, not less than six feet in height and closed by gates of the same height and quality.

SECTION 2.

Where such premises are enclosed by a fence as required by the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Farmington, such fence shall be deemed sufficient under this Ordinance.

SECTION 3.

The gates to such storage area shall be kept securely locked when such area is unoccupied.

SECTION 4.

"Open lot storage" shall include all storage of materials, equipment, or supplies not within a completely enclosed building.

"Commercial or industrial materials, equipment, or supplies" shall include all such materials, equipment, or supplies owned, stored, or used by any person, firm, partnership, corporation, or other legal entity in connection with any business carried on within the Township of Farmington or elsewhere.

SECTION 5.

Failure of any owner, lessee, or other person in possession of premises used for such open lot storage to erect and maintain the fence required in Section 1 hereof shall be a violation of this Ordinance. Violation of this Ordinance shall be a misdemeanor, and conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100 or by imprisonment for not exceeding thirty (30) days or by both, at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 6.

The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to open lots used by automobiles or equipment dealers, lawn furniture dealers or similar organizations, for the retail display and sale of such merchandise or equipment, when such lot is located upon a main highway and does not present substantial hazards to the public health and safety.

SECTION 7.

This Ordinance will become effective thirty (30) days after first publication in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan.

Births on Decline In State Since '57

Michigan's birth-rate has undergone a leveling-off during the past three years, indicate latest statistics issued by the Michigan Department of Health. In fact, since the state endured a record number of births in 1957 there has been a slight decline, the statistics show.

Births during the first half of 1959 in Michigan are less than those recorded during the same period of 1958 and 1957. Six-month figures for each of the three years are: 93,457 for 1959; 95,250 for 1958; and 95,754 for 1957. Michigan's record year, 1957, found 297,277 babies born.

Since June 1958, the monthly figures generally have been running behind the corresponding month of the previous year, reports the state's Health Department.

Local Horse Entered at Wolverine Raceway

Farmington hopefuls at Wolverine Raceway Saturday night will find one local entry competing in the proceedings at the Livonia oval.

It is "Kar Goose Peathers," a pacer owned by Karsten's Cafeteria Farm here in Farmington.

Kar Goose is scheduled to go in the sixth race Saturday night. It's a Class "C" pacer for a purse of \$1,000. Driver will be Joe Marsh, Jr. The local entry has been in the money five times in 14 outings. Four of the five times Kar Goose finished first.

Dept. of State Cuts Number Of Employees

Although the usual trend for governmental agencies is to increase the number of employees each year one Lansing department has increased services to the public while reducing the number of State employees needed to do the job.

Secretary of State James M. Hare reports that his department was operating last year with 8 per cent less employees without cutting any essential services of State.

The Department of State, besides processing millions of passports, also licenses boats, registers trade marks, supervises elections, issues private detective licenses, registers legislative agents, and performs many other essential governmental services.

Through the use of streamlined procedures, more efficient machines, using employee suggestions, and through departmental reorganization, Hare found it possible to reduce the total manpower for his State-wide operation from 849 last year to 783 this year, a saving of 56 salaries.

"This was done without resorting to brusque layoffs or discharges," Hare said. "As older employees were retired or others left to move elsewhere, to marry, or shift to other jobs, we restructured the organization brought in more efficient equipment, and made gradual savings each month without resorting to sudden morale-harmful personnel changes."

"This is the sort of thing business men and industrialists must do every day to survive," Hare continued. "Government agencies must also realistically evaluate the changing situation and provide all essential services with as much economy as is humanly possible."

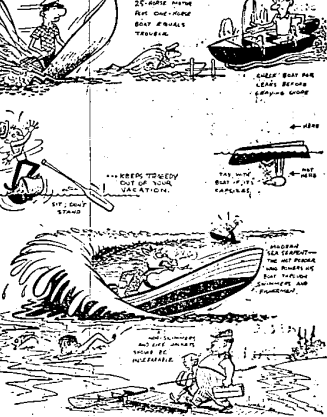

Boating Safety Is No Accident



In boating, as in driving, common sense dictates the rules of safety. The following precautions are among the more important measures to be observed: (1) Be sure your boat is soundly constructed and in seaworthy condition; (2) Equip your boat with an anchor and at least one life-saving cushion or jacket per passenger; (3) Keep in safe distance away from other boats, swimmers and other boaters; (4) Don't stand up over exchange places in a small boat; (5) Don't overload your boat; (6) Don't venture too far from shore that you can't return aboard a public storm; (7) After dark, use a light to prevent collisions.
