Miller, who enters his eleventh year as principal this fall, revealed that there are no remaining teacher vacancies in the senior high school.

Five new teachers have been added to the staff, thus bringing it up to full strength. **Withdraw Star Cutter Rezone**

Star Cutter has withdrawn its request to the township to rezone its property to the north of Gorman from light industry to residential.

This was made known in a letter to the township planning board read at its regular meeting Aug. 13.

**IN OTHER** action the planning board decided to recommend that the township board approve the preliminary plat for the subdivision with the recommended changes, and on condition the sub name be approved of a rezoning by the Gorman to rezone from R-4 to commercial tract at the southeast corner of 14 Mile and Farmington Road.

As the result of recent discussion about failure to carry through on subdivision plans, the plan board also will recommend to the township board that the subdivision regulations be changed to provide that preliminary plats be automatically rescinded after a reasonable time if the subdivider does not come in for an extension of such approval.
