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W. Bloomfield To Vote on Library Tax

Residents of West Bloomfield Township will be asked to go to the polls Tuesday, September 1 to vote on a proposed special one mill tax for the erection of a modern new library.

The proposal calls for this special levy for a three year period. It has been estimated that the one mill levy will provide approximately \$15,000 yearly.

A one acre site, located approximately in the geographical center of the township, was donated to the West Bloomfield Township Public Library by Irvin Cohen, Paul Zucherman and Jack Citron. It was stipulated, however, that the site would have to be used within the next three years.

In the past, West Bloomfield Township residents have had to use the main library in Keego Harbor as well as a branch located on Cedarbank Road in Westland. Since Keego Harbor is no longer in the township, however, the main library facilities there will no longer be available to township residents.

A building to house 50,000 books has been designed, including in it a library's office, staff room, work room, juvenile and adult service areas and a multi-purpose room. It was designed in such a manner to be used for special meetings, lectures and exhibits as well.

Although only \$1 per \$1,000 is being asked for it will figure out that the building was assessed valuation after the equalization factor has been applied, library officials revealed.

Memberships In MEA Climb

Oakland county (Region 7) of the Michigan Education Association showed an increase in both MEA and National Education Association membership for 1958-59, according to current figures.

The Farmington public school system has approximately 200 members in the MEA. As of June 30, Oakland County's Region Seven had a membership of 5,235 in the MEA and 1,856 in the NEA. 1957-58 figures were 5,044 and 1,883 respectively.

The Farmington schools have been recognized as an individual education district by the MEA for six years. The local association is the Farmington Education Association.

Total membership in the MEA is currently more than 53,000, nearly 3,000 higher than last year's total.

Reminds School Cyclists of Responsibilities

With the reopening of school only days away, City of Farmington Police Chief J. G. Devriendt reminded students dependent on bicycles for transportation of the responsibilities they assume upon riding in traffic.

"Bike riders must obey all traffic signs and signals and turn, as do the operators of motor vehicles. They should ride in single file on the right hand side of the street at all times, and not against traffic," Chief Devriendt said.

The local law enforcement officer also reminded motorists of their responsibilities to young cyclists will be joining the early morning traffic flow and urged them to show riders the proper traffic courtesies.

"Drivers should be alert for bike riders during the pre-school hours in the morning," he said, "and at all times when in the vicinity of schools." And motor vehicle operators should observe school zone signs at all times, as is required by law, for the safety of the students.

He indicated his satisfaction with the extremely low bicycle accident rate in the community and said that the interest taken in bikes and bike riding by various civic and fraternal organizations had much to do with the reduction of cycling mishaps.

Chief Devriendt said that all bike riders should have their two-wheelers checked by a competent mechanic at the start of the school term each fall to insure that lights, brakes and signaling devices are working properly and safely. He noted that a Bicycle Institute of America survey indicated about 24 million children in the United States depended upon bikes for school transportation.

The Chief also reminded drivers that a state law prohibits any vehicle from passing a halted school bus from any direction.

Sound Cleans Fragile Jewelry

Taking a cue from industry, which uses it in high-precision parts and complex assemblies, many retail jewelry stores are now providing customers with ultrasonic cleaning services for delicate brooches, expansion bracelets, watch bands and baubles.

In this new method, which does not damage the most fragile jewelry, sub-microscopic bubbles created in the water or other cleaning liquid by high frequency sound waves are forced into tiny crevices and holes that would not be reached in any other way.

Expanding against every surface, the bubbles blast away dirt completely which eliminates the need for chemical cleaners that could corrode highly finished metal or discolor precious stones.
