

Attends National Presbyterian Youth Council Meet in Oklahoma

Terry Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Royal E. Davis, 3372 Oakland, has just returned from the National Youth Council of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., which met at the Presbyterian related University of Tulsa, in Tulsa, Oklahoma, August 14-21.

He was one of ten delegates from the Michigan Youth Synod following the merger of two Presbyterian church bodies. Nearly 400 persons, including delegates from 24 Synods, fraternal delegates from all over the world and staff personnel from all the adult boards of the Presbyterian Church were in attendance.

The purpose of the Council was to determine next steps in developing a more effective youth ministry. The emphasis was on youth becoming a more integral part of the life of the church.

A statement of purpose was adopted and a set of guidelines was drawn up to implement this purpose. A recommendation was made that there be more emphasis on youth and adults working together.

United Presbyterian Youth was chosen as the name of the merged youth programs of the church. It was agreed to use the five program areas of Faith, Witness, Citizenship, Fellowship and Outreach which are used in interdenominational youth work. Special areas of emphasis were set up for the coming year.

The National Youth Project for the coming year is "Help for the Inner City." There were nine study groups on different phases of church life which presented important recommendations concerning these areas.

Terry was on the study group on Evangelism and on the committee that drafted the recommendations of that study group. Two outstanding recommendations included help for the inner city and more specialized summer conference opportunities.

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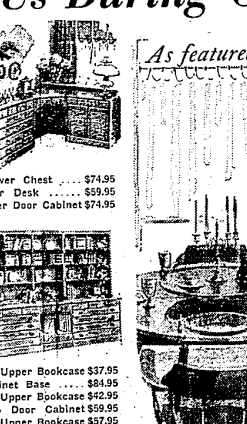
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Kendallwood News Bits
