State Starts Grape Harvest

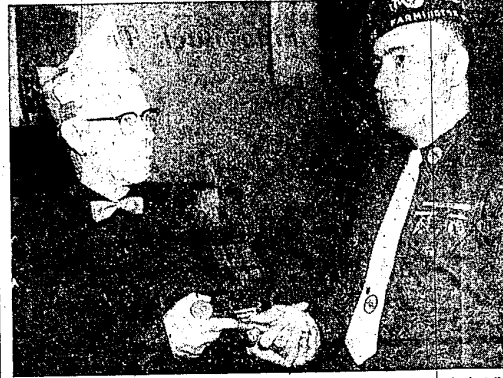
There should be plenty of grapes in Michigan this year for jellies and jams or nibbling. A yield of 56,000 tons of grapes is expected.

The harvest of early varieties is just beginning and will continue until frost-time. The state's 1959 yield should be the second largest east of the Pacific coast and will be 5,500 tons more than Michigan's grape harvest of last year.

The average grape production for the years spanning 1948 to 1957 was 37,650 tons. Michigan's principal grape variety is the large blue Concord.

Michigan's commercial production of grapes is located in the southwestern area of the state.

Student Parking-Driving Control Set Up at C'ville Senior High

A student parking-and-driving regulation system, complete with automobile stickers, will go into effect next month at Clarendonville senior high school. Purpose of the regulation system is to provide better control of and protection for Clarendonville senior high drivers during the school year, explained Principal Max A. Miller.

"It is not a method of restricting the student drivers," he added. "SET UP with the full knowledge of Livonia police, the system will permit only those students with a valid need to drive back and forth to school. Students in grades 9 through 12 are involved."

The Livonia police will perform periodic road checks to assure that there are no students driving when they should be in classes.

Three stickers will be issued, depending on the type of use the student may use his car before and after school, but must keep it parked during school hours.

1. Full-time parking permission in the school lot. The student may use his car before and after school, but must keep it parked during school hours.

2. Part-time parking whereby the student may leave at a special time during school hours so as to go to work.

3. Identification of the cars belonging to the school administrative staff, so that all cars parked in the school parking lot are identified.

THE STICKERS will be issued at no charge to the student-driver when it has been determined that they have valid need for the car during the school day. Temporary permits will be issued until the program may be set in motion soon after
