Timely Tips on GARDENING

AUTUMN'S APPROACH—Gathering flocks of birds and the autumn sky, swooping down to sample the furry cones of sumac berries or the glistening scarlet viburnum. While the birds have turned a burnished gold, these same fields were clothed in Spring with sprouts of tender green. Then with musty autumn winds and their bright yellow bloom and in turn were followed by dusty violet thistles. Now goldenrod dominates the scene, as was the case with each preceding period of bloom, is so abundant that it seems the sole possessor of the field, sharing it with many, but seemingly with none.

FROST—The sunny days and cool nights of late summer and early autumn bring added sparkle to the garden. Lawns are rich, deep green that is the perfect foil for the vividly colored late blooming flowers. Vegetable gardens are continuing to produce their bountiful harvest. However, some night in the near future temperatures will take a sudden drop and early frost will find the lawn and garden clothed with white frost. Hardy perennials and hardy vegetables are unaffected by early, light frosts. Some of the hardier annuals are not affected either, but tender flowers, such as marigolds and zinnias, are destroyed when frost comes. Frost is most apt to occur on clear, starry nights. On cloudy nights, the clouds serve as an insulating blanket which holds the earth's warmth soaked up from the sun during the day. Also, the weather is fickle, and a frost in late September or early October apt to be followed by a month of mild, frost-free weather.

Because of this, many gardeners prepare in advance to protect some plants, or even entire beds, from early frosts. A box or basket inverted over a choice clump of flowers will save them for future enjoyment. Sheets of newspaper will protect adequately, too, but are less convenient to use, because they are hard to anchor securely so they will not blow away. Old bed sheets or bedspreads work well, but should be arranged so they cover the plants without actually touching them. Sheets are especially useful in the vegetable garden to cover tomatoes, eggplant and peppers.

Collect boxes and other covering material in advance. Don't wait until frost is covered. Also, decide in advance which plants need protecting and which can conveniently be covered. Plants close to the house, especially on the south side, and those beneath an overhang already have some protection.
