Public Attitude Toward Mental Illness Changes

Public attitude toward mental illness is becoming much healthier, in the opinion of a psychiatrist at The University of Michigan Medical Center.

Dr. Moses M. Frolich says that the old fear and shame of mental illness is giving way to a more realistic attitude.

The public now recognizes that we can become emotionally ill just as we sometimes become physically sick," he notes.

"Furthermore, we are getting to recognize that mental illness can help with emotional difficulties."

Dr. Frolich outlines his views in a tape recorded discussion with Dr. H. Walter Bird of the U-M Neuro-psychiatric Institute.

The two agree there are no such symptoms which definitely indicate a mental illness.

In time of stress, emotional reactions or symptoms may be normal, says Dr. Frolich. "However, if these reactions are excessive in degree, if they are excessively prolonged, or if they are not appropriate to the situation, illness may be suspected."

The doctors say the public is learning that though the beginning of mental illness may be difficult to diagnose, it is no more "shameful" than an illness caused by some germ and requires prompt medical care if chronic disease is to be avoided.
