1st Baptist Dedication Set Sunday Afternoon

On Sunday afternoon at 3 p.m. another important milestone will be marked in the long history of Farmington's First Baptist church, the second oldest church of this denomination in Michigan.

At Sunday's special service the new \$105,000 sanctuary and the new Bible School facilities will be opened. Farmington's First Baptist church is located on Shawnee at Farmington Road.

INVITATIONS have been extended to members of the local government, to Farmington businessmen, and to local and state clergymen, plus representatives of national organizations with which the church is affiliated. Members and friends of the congregation will also participate in the new opening.

Dr. Howard Sugden of Lansing has been chosen as speaker for the dedication service while Sheldon Knowles and Mrs. Floyd Leck will be instrumental and vocal soloists. Rosalia Wilson is organist for the occasion.

Since its founding in 1826 the First Baptist Church has erected four sanctuaries, the latest built to accommodate 600 people. THE NEW building has several unique features including a new air conditioning allowing separate temperature control of any area; modernized doors providing 23 classrooms; a public address system throughout.

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Get the Facts Before Taking Autumn Tour

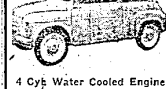
Autumn travelers are reminded that the Michigan Tourist Council office, a personalized service to keep them informed on the progress of the state's fall color spectacular.

A card or letter to the tourist council office, Lansing 20, is all that's necessary to insure against the disappointment of missing any of fall's fleeting beauty, council spokesman said.

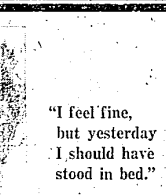
The post card mailing system — only one of its kind in the nation — is set in motion as soon as the first patches of color appear in upper peninsula woodlands.
