

Falcons Nip Rochester, 20-13

After trailing 13-7 at half-time, the Farmington Falcons rallied in the second half Friday night to take a 20-13 victory over Rochester High.

The score at the end of the first quarter was even more disheartening to Farmington rooters as they watched a host of Rochester players score touchdowns in quick succession.

But the Falcons surged back in the second frame when quarterback Harv Chapman moved his squad 65 yards in 10 plays for Farmington's first score. Two touchdowns in the second half wrapped it up for the Falcons.

IT WAS the victory No. 11 in a row for Coach Jack Hayes' gridders in a win-streak dating back to late 1957. It also set the stage for the Falcons' defense of their title.

Rochester opened the scoring early in the contest when Bill Deneen intercepted a pass attempt by Farmington's Chapman. A few plays later, Rochester's quarterback, John Cadieux, slammed through the Falcon line to put Rochester ahead. The extra point was good and the score was 7-0.

Shortly after, Rochester's halfback, Don Lickert, scored 56 yards up the middle to give his team's first touchdown. The score remained 13-0 when the extra point failed.

FUP FALCONS narrowed the margin to 13-7 by virtue of the 65-yard sustained drive engineered by Chapman. Key plays in the march were runs of 12 and 15 yards by fleet halfback Jack Atchison and Chapman, respectively.

Chapman scored on a three-yard plunge and then kicked the extra point to make it 13-7. Halfback Ron Rader ended the Falcons to tie the count at 13-13 early in the third period when he broke loose on a spiraling 70-yard punt return to score.

Farmington's defensive line contained the Rochester attack easily in the last two frames.

And then John Anderson, Farmington end, intercepted a pass on Rochester's 30 and sprinted to the one yard line before being brought down.

The play developed when the Falcon line, Dave Brown, Chester's Cadieux deep into his own territory on a pass try.

When Cadieux' attempted pass was intercepted by Brown, Anderson returned to the Rochester end.

A 15-YARD penalty delayed the Falcons' drive. But halfback Larry Hawkins gained 20 yards in two attempts to set up the tie-breaker.

Chapman sliced around end for the score and with his extra point kick, the Falcons took the lead in the eleventh straight.

The game was marred by excessive penalties to both clubs. The Falcons were penalized 10 times for eight infractions and Rochester lost 50 yards on four penalties. In the first quarter, a penalty to Farmington's Chapman for illegal motion in the backfield nullified the run.

Atchison led the Farmington gridders with 69 yards in 15 carries. Chapman had 57 yards in 10 tries. Rader 31 yards in nine attempts. Rochester's fullback, Bill Deneen, led both teams with 112 yards in nine carries. Farmington completed only one out of seven pass attempts, while Rochester had three completions in nine tries.

The Falcons journey to Wisner stadium in Pontiac tomorrow evening to inaugurate the season by playing against Pontiac Northern. Game time is 8 p.m.

W. Bloomfield Mauls Clarenceville, 34-12

The Clarenceville Trojans dropped their first league football encounter of the new season last Friday evening when West Bloomfield over-ran the locals, 34-12.

Only bright aspect of the Trojans efforts in the game was the brilliant running of halfback Bruce Freels, a 160-pound junior.

Freels clicked up 275 yards rushing and scored both Clarenceville touchdowns—as the Trojans suffered their second setback of the 1959 campaign.

THE FLEET halfback, a newcomer to the Clarenceville varsity, scored on runs of 26 and 80 yards. He also reeled off 60 yards on a reverse but was held short of the goal line.

The Trojans capitalized early in the first quarter and shaped a six-point lead. West Bloomfield fumbled and Clarenceville recovered. It was then that Freels set it up on his 26-yard scoring jolt.

The Trojans shifted over to the extra point attempt failed, the Trojans held a 6-0 lead.

The Lakers quickly nullified this margin with a touchdown early in the second quarter. A second pass attempt was good and West Bloomfield led 7-6. That also ended Clarenceville's hopes for its first grid victory of 1959.

The Trojans showed over two more touchdowns in the second period to take a commanding 21-6 halftime lead.

A CLARENCEVILLE punt was blocked and a 20-yard run by a West Bloomfield back tallied one of the two second-quarter scores. A second pass play converted another tally a short while later.

A fumble in the third period halted a Clarenceville scoring drive inches from the goal. But the Lakers also fumbled on their ensuing drive with Clarenceville taking over on its 20.

On the next play, Freels raced 30 yards for the Trojans' only other scoring thrust.

Two short aerials in the fourth stanza accounted for West Bloomfield's last two touchdowns. One pass was for 10 yards and the other for 15.

Both Doug Hammond and Ron Warren played West Bloomfield with injuries which had prevented them from working out all "daily" games.

Tomorrow evening the Trojans host Clarkson at 8 p.m. in their first home game of the year.

Coach Ron Mrozinski closed the game with a 20-0 lead. The final score was 27-6.
