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Final Plat Plans Get Council OK

After considerable hesitation today night the city council approved a final plat for Farmington Acres IV and V, located northeast of the present city limits. The plat, known as Eight Mile and Farmington Road, was approved by a preliminary plat plan had been given by the council nearly a year ago.

The council's hesitation Monday evening was prompted by another matter which had arisen earlier in the meeting. At the time, a proposal had been made to the council by the city planning commission to increase minimum lot sizes from 10,000 to 15,000 sq. ft. in Farmington Acres IV and V. The lots are mostly 66 feet in width. There are approximately 60 homes in the plat.

Councilman W. V. Brockington moved that the final plat be approved. "I feel that the council should stand behind its earlier decision since all of our requirements have been met in this final plat," he said.

For several moments it appeared that no second to Brockington's motion would be forthcoming. The city attorney told Mayor Robert Lindberth that, very possibly, a court case would result.

Finally, Councilman Hugo Peterson seconded the motion. On a roll-call vote all but Howard Thayer abstained. The final plat was passed 4-1, subject to the payment of a \$120 plat-filing fee.

C'ville Senior Is Semi-Finalist

A Clarenceville High senior is a semi-finalist in the 1959-60 National Merit Scholarship competition, school officials announced Tuesday.

He is David Pillar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Pillar, 18427 Foch, Livonia. David is among 10,000 high scorers on the National Merit Scholarship qualifying test, a nationwide exam to determine educational development.

The examination was given to more than 600,000 student competitors in more than 14,500 high schools last spring.

The 10,000 will take another rigorous test, the Scholastic Achievement Test, on December 5 to determine the finalists. It is estimated that 4,000 of the semi-finalists will receive direct or indirect scholarship assistance as a result of this competition.

Plat Approval Not Too Likely

A preliminary plat for a 20-acre subdivision on an 18-acre parcel of land on Middlebrook Road just south of Ulfes Lane in Wood Creek Farms Village appears unlikely to gain approval.

Submitted to the Village Council Tuesday night by the land owners and a developer interested in buying the acreage to subdivide it, the plat calls for lots from 20,000 square feet ranging upward.

Minimum lot size requirements under the village zoning ordinance is 33,000 square feet.

The council tabled action to permit a more detailed study of the plat. Action will be taken at a special meeting later in the month, it was indicated.

Bronaugh said that Farmington, Northville and Novi customers will call 9-9900 instead of the old number GR 4-9900.

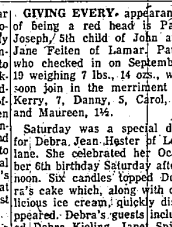
If the old number is called after October 12, a recording change and give the new number for the business office.
