Falcons Nip Waterford; Seek Share of League Title

Confronted by tomorrow night's blue-chip battle with Walled Lake, the Farmington Falcons may no longer dwell on any lustre they uncovered in last Friday's 12-0 victory over Waterford High.

In fact, Farmington journeyed to Walled Lake, the only significance of the win over Waterford a week ago is that it leaves the Falcons, at the moment, with a slender chance of retaining a portion of their 1958 conference crown.

The Falcons will match their current 21 league record against Walled Lake's unblemished 30 conference standing and its uncontested hold on first place.

Oddsmakers would favor the Walled Lake gridders and particularly in view of the fact that the game finds Farmington traveling to its opponent's gridiron.

To make matters worse for the locals, Walled Lake is scheduled to play at the state in class A tomorrow night, and the schoolboy circles.

Despite a scintillating Farmington attack last Friday afternoon here, the Waterford Skipper's proved no match.

In between numerous futile attempts to score, the Falcons managed to shove over two successful tallies to wrap up the disjointed game.
