Gets College Soccer Letter

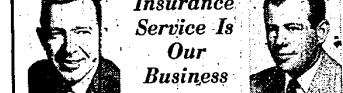
Midway College has awarded varsity letters to 18 men for their participation in soccer this past fall.

William Grace 2nd Graders Set Out Many Bird Feeders

Second grade pupils in Room 1 at the William Grace School set out bird feeders on the school grounds during the week.

The class was assisted by their teacher, Mrs. Marion Spencer, and by Mrs. Douglas Haywood.

This project will be the class' contribution to the annual Michigan State Pervoy. The project for 1960 because of the importance attached to community participation in conservation in this project, much time and effort was spent by the class.

Preparation was begun about a month before the finished project was realized. Many of the bird materials were used to accomplish this end including science textbooks, library books, newspaper articles, still pictures, movies, and actual bird feeders in use. These feeders were seen by the children during their field trip last October. Charles Damm, a nature teacher at Kensington Park, pointed these feeders out to the class while on a hike down Tamarae Trail.

Some of the children brought logs, wood, cast hangers, and bottle caps to school from home. These materials were used by the children to make the feeders in the classroom. Some feeders were made at home with the assistance of parents and other interested adults. The feeders that proved most popular with the children was the one made by nailing bottle caps to small logs. These caps were filled in the classroom with bird seed and put on a stick of butter and ground suet.

Detroit Can Be Crossroads, Says Mackie

Metropolitan Detroit can become the most accessible city in the world if it makes full use of its land, air and sea transportation advantages, Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said recently.

Metropolitan Detroit's advantages in water, air and surface transportation will give it more prominence as one of America's finest cities for business, industry and recreation," Mackie said.

The Highway Commissioner said Metropolitan Detroit will be "a crossroads for all forms of transportation." The city continues to develop its port facilities, the Detroit Metropolitan Airport and its expressway system.

Mackie said Detroit, which now has 20 miles of expressway, will need 40 miles of new expressways by 1962, an additional 40 miles by 1967 and a total of 200 miles of expressways by 1975 "to carry the expected load of traffic."
