## FHS Matmen Win Opener Dec. 3, 31-21

Victory greeted the Falcons on their first meet of the year as they bested Edsel Ford 31-21, December 3. Five Falcons pins and two decisions provided the crowd of over 200 fans with thrills and excitement. Bob Mazur, at 95 lbs., started the Falcons out with a fast pin (3:20). Ken Jones, wrestling on class above his weight, was pinned and the meet score was at 5-5. Bob Cook put the Falcons in the lead to stay with a pin in 57 seconds in the 112 lb. class.

Richard Cook, Bob's twin brother, also wrestling above his weight, lost a 2-9 decision. Randy Jordan retaliated at 127 lbs. with a 9-0 victory and John Wagner added another three points to the team score with a 4-1 decision.

Jerry Cassell, 138 lbs., moved with lightning speed and recorded the fastest pin of the night in 22 seconds. Pat McCutcheon followed with a second period pin (3:34).

Dick Lam lost a close decision 4-5 because of riding time. Bill Uppliger, at 155 lbs., recorded the final Falcon pin and a 4-1 decision.
