This is also the last week for the Christmas Seal Coasting Contest. Entry blanks may be picked up at Federal Department Stores or by calling the Society office. The contest is for boys and girls between the ages of 6 and 12 years, and the contest closes on December 16. Four bicycles are being awarded to winners.

Additional Christmas Seals are available at the Society for people who did not receive one for their holiday cards and packages or those who did not receive them in the mail.

Christmas Seal money goes for finding people with tuberculosis through free chest X-rays and skin testing as well as an extensive education and medical research program. Christmas Seal dollars also send 500 Detroit and Wayne County children to the Christmas Seal Camp of the Detroit Tuberculosis Sanatorium near Chelsea each summer.

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# Area Tourist Council Meets At Botsford Inn

A broader tourist promotional program for 1960 was approved by the members attending the 15th Annual Meeting of the Southeastern Michigan Tourist Association, held Tuesday, December 1st, at Botsford Inn, Farmington.

Secretary-Manager Leonard Thompson, in his annual report, emphasized the growing recognition of the Detroit Metropolitan Area as a Southern Michigan from the Ohio line to Saginaw Bay as a fine vacation and recreational area. A greater number of inquiries, requests for information on the attractions and the tourist facilities than in any previous year, indicated the popularity of this region.

To properly service the request of this increasing number of potential visitors requires a wide base of membership and an increased income, said Thompson.

An afternoon tourist promotional clinic was held which included the premier showing of the State Highway Department's new film on Southeastern Michigan's expressways and limited access highways by Irving Rubin, Exec. Asst. to Commissioner Mackie.

A colored slide presentation of the attractions of this area was made by William Tooley of Greenfield Village, and an explanation of the Michigan Tourist Council's increasing work for the next fiscal year was given by Robert Furlong of the Michigan Tourist Council.

The story of "1960 U.S.A. YEAR" as endorsed by President Eisenhower and the National Assn. of Travel Organizations, also presented by Frank Davis of Bay City, Sec. of East Michigan Tourist Assn.

The program was climaxed by an appeal from Dick McLain, Gen. Mgr. of Dearborn and Chairman of the Board of SEMTA, for a greater effort on the part of the association's 399 plus members to interest their suppliers and neighboring establishments to join in this nonprofit program of building an increased tourist volume for the Southeastern section of Michigan.

At the business session, Fred Reese, treasurer of the association, reported that nearly \$80,000 had been expended during the past year by the association in promoting new tourist travel from other areas and also publicizing the attractions throughout the eight counties surrounding Detroit to its citizens.

Keith Hallenbeck, Director of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, was re-elected president of the association for the coming year. The Detroit Canada Tunnel Co., was re-elected treasurer.

John W. Ahlert, proprietor of Botsford Inn, was re-elected to the board of directors of the SEMTA for another year.

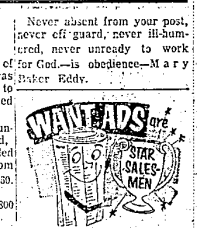
The next victim of DRINKARD is unknown.
