## Health Scholarships Offered Through New March of Dimes

All high schools and accredited colleges in Oakland County are receiving application forms for the 1960 Health Scholarships offered by the National Foundation; it was announced by Rev. G. Burton Hodgson, chairman of the county chapter.

The Health Scholarships, to which the state is entitled by population, will be supported by funds from the New March of Dimes campaign in January against the crippling diseases of birth defects, arthritis and paralytic polio.

Each scholarship will pay \$500 a year, or a total of \$2,000 for four years of training in one of five key health professions of medicine, nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy and medical social work.

"THE NATIONAL Foundation's Health Scholarship Program," said Hodgson, "is one of the three weapons by which the world's biggest voluntary health organization is fighting the crippling diseases that affect one family in four in this country."

"The scholarship training will help relieve the desperate shortage of experts for our hospitals, clinics and treatment centers. The other two weapons are medical research, which produced the Salk Vaccine, and patient aid, which provides medical care for victims of crippling diseases."

High school seniors or college students interested in Health Scholarships should request applications from their principals, deans or career counselors, or the Oakland County Chapter of the National Foundation at 75 W. Huron, Pontiac.

HODGSON POINTED out that the county chapter is still providing care for 250 polio patients and that all the funds raised in Oakland County have been needed to do that job.

Said Mr. Hodgson: "That's why Oakland County must increase its support for the March of Dimes. The triple targets of arthritis, which has claimed 11,000,000 victims in this country; birth defects, an affliction touching one out of every 16 children; and the continuing burden of caring for pre-Salk polio victims, have brought greater responsibilities to the National Foundation."

"Our immediate need is for volunteer workers, men or women, who can enlist by calling FEderal 8-0411. Then, in January, we must ask for even more generous financial support so that thousands of crippled youngsters and adults can be helped toward a brighter future."

## Highway Death Rate Lower In November

Despite the early arrival of winter and hazardous driving conditions, 43 fewer persons were killed in Michigan traffic in November than in the same month a year ago, according to a provisional report issued by the State Police.


But even with the unusual reduction, 121 deaths compared with 164 in November last year, it is expected the year will end with more fatalities than in 1958.

November was the fifth month this year in which there were fewer fatalities than in the corresponding month of the previous year.

At the end of 11 months, the provisional death toll stands at 1,284, or 51 more than at this time a year ago and a four per cent increase. Based on past records, the death toll for 1959 will be between 1,425 and 1,450, or 50 to 75 more than the 1,375 persons who died in 1958. This would be an increase of between three and five per cent.

Final figures for October showed 125 deaths, 13 more than in that month a year ago, or a 12 per cent increase. There were 8,599 persons injured in 17,766 accidents, also increases of 35 and 26 per cent, respectively.

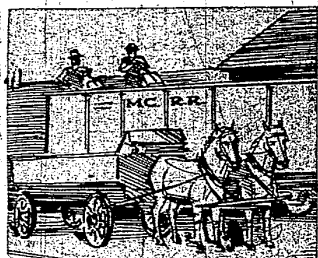
Estimated travel for the first nine months, the latest figure available, was 22.5 billion miles, up five per cent over the same period a year ago. The death rate of 4.5 per cent per 100 million miles of travel was five per cent higher.

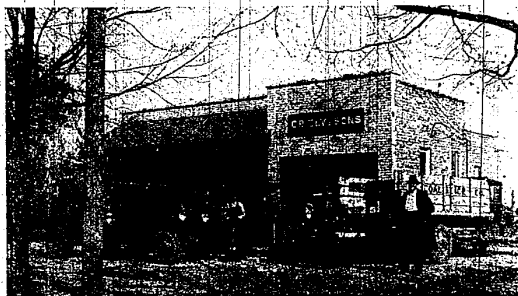

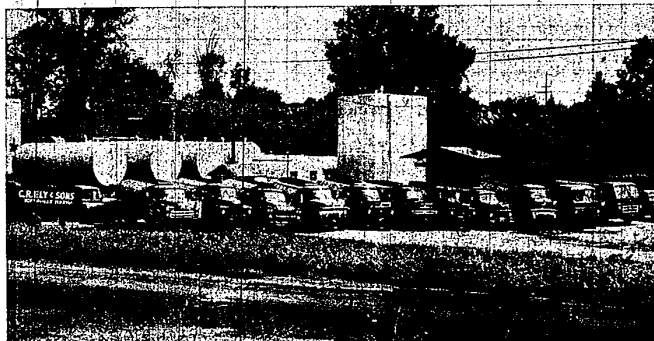
