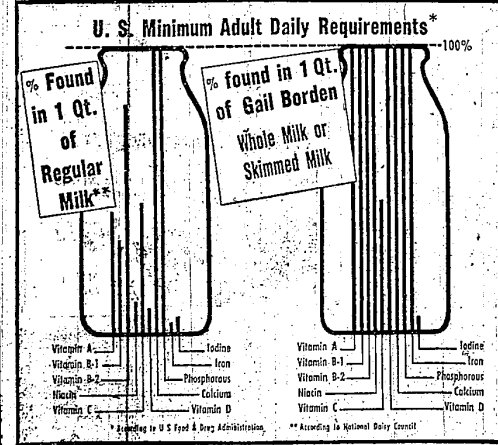

Nov. Attendant Record Set At Kensington

A new November attendance record was set last month when approximately 4,100 persons visited the Nature Center at Kensington Metropark in Park to give in the busiest November since the building opened in 1957.

There were approximately 3,100 visitors in November 1958 and 2,100 in November 1957. An additional 4,700 persons participated in field trips or listened to lectures on "natural science" last month.

Bill Hopkins, chief naturalist for the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, said that these figures point out increased use of the Nature Center and the adjoining nature trails.
