Clarenceville's Trojans chalked up their second straight league win Friday night as they swept past the West Bloomfield Lakers, 62-49.

Playing Friday night before the home fans for the first time this season, the Trojans were

led by senior Gene Scholes who played his first game. Gene scored 21 points and was active in the rebounding department. He was followed in scoring by Bob Warren who collected 17. Doug Hanford and Tony Giacobazzi assisted in controlling the backboards.

CHS jumped to a five-point lead in the first period, but the Trojans had moved out from by a 3-2 advantage, and at the end of the third quarter they were out of danger as they led the Lakers 49-34. The Trojans held a 20-point margin at one point in the third quarter.

Falcon high scorers were Norm Cedar and Larry Hawkins with 15 and 11 points, respectively.

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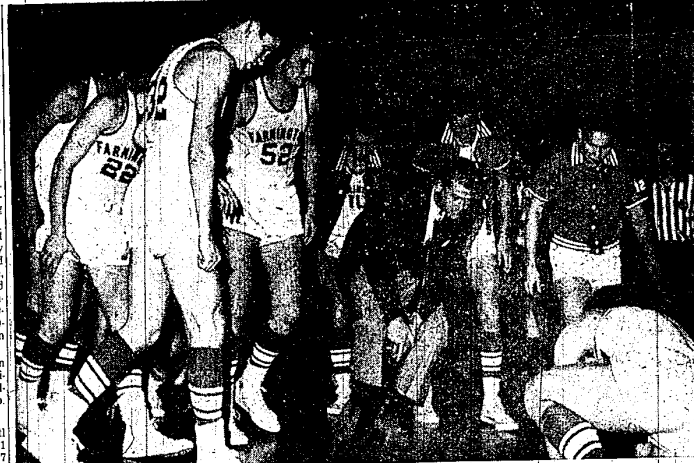

From the first basket until the final buzzer, the Falcons maintained a lead which they never relinquished. Farmington dominated the scoring in the first quarter to lead 11-5 at the end of that period.

Although Berkeley outscored the Falcons in the second quarter by a margin of 10 points to Farmington's eight, the Falcons held a 19-15 lead at halftime.

Falcon eagles' aim was sure as ever and during the third quarter 10 shots flew through the hoop, six of which were field goals. The last period followed a similar pattern with the Falcons tallying 16 points to the Bears' eight, bringing the grand total to 51-32.

Bill Smith, Falcon forward and guard, battled for scoring honors in the second half, with Smith emerging as winner with 18 points and Chapman following close behind with 16, 14 of them made in the second half. Guard Darryl Allen's accuracy at the foul line proved beneficial as he added 10 points, six being free throws, to the Falcons' score.

Bob Salay, forward, added three points and center Tom Guy and guard Bud Smith had two apiece.

This weekend the Falcons will see double action with a league game at Walled Lake Friday night and a non-conference contest with Northville on Saturday.
