Michigan Made Medical History

The first important medical discovery to come from the new world took place in the Michigan wilderness.

So says Dr. C. Thomas Flotte, who teaches a course in medical history at The University of Michigan Medical Center.

The discovery was Dr. William Beaumont's detailed study of the workings of the human stomach. His patient was the celebrated French trapper, Alexis St. Martin. A gun-shot wound had opened a "window" in St. Martin's stomach through which Dr. Beaumont made observations that revolutionized traditional medical beliefs.

"This discovery caused a sensation in Europe," Dr. Flotte reports. "It was difficult for the European traditionalists to believe that from such a wild area as the wilderness of Michigan such outstanding research on gastric physiology could develop."

Beaumont's work at Mackinac Island was the first of three American medical discoveries that occurred in the early 1800's, the U-M doctor says.

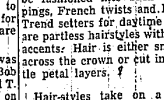
The other two were the discovery of anesthesia and the first successful abdominal operation. The latter was performed by Dr. Ephraim McDowell, a surgeon from Danville, Kentucky.

The three events started American medicine on its way toward challenging, and finally surpassing, European medical science so that today America has become the medical center of the whole world, Dr. Flotte declares.

Age Does Not The Altar Ban

Society should not ridicule marriages by older persons, a University of Michigan gerontologist believes.

Woodrow W. Hunter, a research associate in the U-M Division of Gerontology, says older people sometimes have a stereotyped attitude toward old age which leads to misunderstanding of older people who are happy to find happiness through marriage.

"This is not to say that all older folks should marry," he explains. "But if they have evaluated their health, compatibility for living and normal expectations for remaining life, marriage after 60 can be successful."

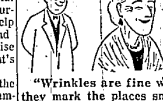
Younger people often feel older people do not have the capacity for love, Hunter adds. "Yet we know, from the standpoint of one's needs, that love and affection are necessary throughout life."

When friends and companionship dwindle during the later years, Hunter reasons, the loss of its primary motivating forces. A marriage partner can supplement this friendship need.

Hunter reports that little research has been attempted on marriage after 60 and that which has been completed is limited in scope. He says that there is a considerable need for such study, however, since more facts could eliminate some of the erroneous attitudes toward elderly marriages in our society.

Skip the Clown Best Performer

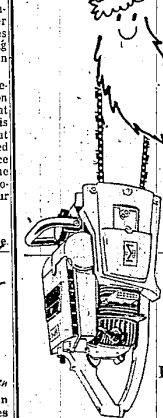
Skip the Clown, Farmington's own Frank Klus of Orchard Lake Road, was awarded a trophy last week by the Rochester Chamber of Commerce.
