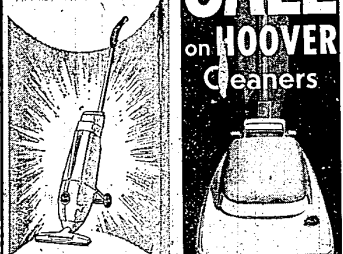

RESOLUTION: WHEREAS certain amendments to the Farmington Building and Electrical Code Ordinance are deemed necessary to bring the Farmington Township Board and Ordinance in line with the Section 2 of Act 185 of 1943 under which such ordinances were enacted; and WHEREAS the result of the public notice prior to passage of such ordinances or amendments thereto is hereby reported; NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved:

1. That the Township Board of Farmington Township intends to proceed under the provisions of Act 185 of 1943 to amend the Farmington Township Building and Electrical Code Ordinances, in accordance with the amendments annexed hereto.

2. That such action will be taken at the regular meeting of the Township Board to be held on December 22, 1959.

3. That this resolution be published in the Farmington Enterprise, Farmington, Michigan, within ten (10) days of the date hereof.

BUILDING CODE AMENDMENT: THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON ORDINANCES: The Farmington Township Building Code Ordinance, effective December 13, 1955, is amended by the addition of the following exceptions from the Building Code adopted by reference therein:

FIRE RESISTIVE MATERIALS: On all commercial buildings, where combustible materials are permitted, they must be protected by covering with a non-combustible material of not less than one (1) hour fire rating. This would be a minimum of one-half inch rock lath. Min. 1/2 inch steel lath on a rock lath base. Fibre glass tile on a rock lath base.

2. HOUSE SHELLS: No "shells" shall be permitted in the Township. All permits issued shall be a completed home and the permit holder shall be held responsible for the structure.

Any Deer Hunt Seasons Safe: Those who think that present any deer hunting seasons are more dangerous than bucks only deer seasons will be happy to learn that they are wrong. As a matter of fact, during the 1959 season just ended, Michigan deer hunters again had the lowest total accidents below a total of 60 for the fifth straight year. During the years 1946-54, however, deer hunting was the most dangerous sport, with the lowest total accidents for any year in that period was 1951, when 87 persons were killed or wounded. The average for that period was 72 accidents.

A variety of any deer seasons have been under way in Michigan since 1946, but only since 1958 have the present large-scale quota and area seasons been under way. And it's been during these "shoot-out" seasons that deer hunting has been safest. Not only has the rate of accidents per 100,000 hunters been steadily declining, but also the actual number of accidents per deer season has been generally lower.
