Give Tips on Wax Dripping

Candles glow at Christmas dinners. And sometimes the candle wax drips on tablecloths. Home economists at Michigan State University refresh your memory on how to remove candle wax or paraffin from fabrics.

To remove as much wax as possible, place the stain between clean white blotters or several layers of facial tissues and press with a warm iron. To remove remaining stain, sponge with a grease solvent. Or, if safe for the fabric, pour boiling water through the spot. Remove any remaining stain with grease solvent.

During winter months, drivers on thoroughfares should allow more distance between themselves and the car ahead, says the Institute for Safer Living of the American Mutual Liability Insurance Company. Poor visibility and other winter conditions often cause drivers to brake suddenly. Tailgate collisions increase as winter darkness falls. Multiple collisions are more frequent.

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
