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# Feel New Water Rights Code Must be Passed in Mich. Soon

The 1984 edition of Michigan's water story will be headlined by increased public demands, says the State Conservation Department.  
For the most part, it will be authored by a population expected to number almost 14,000,000 water users nearly twice the present figure.  
Although the state's water supply will remain essentially the same as it is now, competition for its use will be much keener. The surging population growth will boost domestic and industrial needs, expanding industries will demand more and more water, recreation will continue to forge ahead in water usage, more farms will find irrigation profitable.  
How will the state's water supply handle this growing load of users? The framework of Michigan's water-use regulations has already been challenged as inadequate for today's needs.  
The timing of the development depends somewhat upon when the sewer arm will be built up from the south to serve the area. So far as water is concerned, he plans to build a larger water plant to serve both Friday and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. of Saturday and Sunday. Individual and family groups are invited to hike the several trails without guidance.

ship attorney at which time he recommended legal action and his recommendations were followed.  
"The timing of these matters was entirely coincidental."  
Both the contempt of court case against Michael Hall and the complaint against Nelson are still pending.  
Appearing before Judge Lawson late Friday afternoon, Nelson stood mute and asked for a jury trial. Lawson set a bond of \$50 which Nelson paid. Trial date was set for this week but it was learned Tuesday that it had been postponed for 30 days.  
Nelson said at a special meeting in his office last Saturday that he would probably not proceed with the contempt case against Mike Hall until after the charge against him was cleared up.  
AT THE SPECIAL meeting Saturday in Nelson's office, the services of the new prosecutor, charged against Supervisor Hall was that he was using his political office to get tickets "fixed" for relatives and friends.  
Supervisor Hall flatly denied this Tuesday. All tickets are numbered and the disposition of each case recorded. Some tickets are for justifiable reasons are dismissed, he said, none.  
"The township has a fine police force and I feel confident that the entire force, especially Chief Irving Yakes and Sgt. Thomas Schirber, are carrying out their duties to the letter of the law," Hall said.  
REFERRING to himself as "the manhandled judge," Nelson said that he had been told by the township building department that he needed no occupancy permit before moving into his new building. He said that he was told it would be issued to the builder, George Blair, but that it never was.  
Hall's countering statement Tuesday was that Nelson moved into his new building in October knowing full well that inspections had not been finalized and that no occupancy permit had been given.  
"He could have gotten a temporary permit easily but he never requested one," Hall said.  
Fines for failure to get occupancy permits before moving into new buildings were being collected by the building department up until early when it was learned that the law was not legal and that such matters should be handled in a court of law, the supervisor said.

# Car Tab Sales Down 35 Pct.

You'll be waiting in some long, long lines come the latter part of February, unless more people start coming in to get their 1960 auto license tabs immediately.  
This was the word this week from Gerald Grace, manager of the Farmington branch of the Secretary of State's office.  
New license sales are running about 35 percent below a year ago at this time, Grace reported. And the picture is getting worse instead of better, he added.  
People just don't seem to be coming aware of the fact that this is the time to be getting new plates, Grace said. He attributed at least part of this to the fact that tabs are being issued for 1960 and that, since they are not as noticeable on the few cars that do have them, others are not being encouraged to get theirs.
