Will Ask Hike In Fishing License Fees

Six proposed fishing license fee increases, designed to hike sagging Conservation Department funds, will be recommended to the legislature during the 1960 session.

The Conservation Commission gave unanimous approval to the six increases at its December meeting.

They are: to increase the resident angler's license from \$2 to \$3; to create a resident female angler's license at \$1.50; to create a nonresident five-day license at \$2; to create a nonresident 15-day female license at \$2.00; to create an annual nonresident female license costing about \$70,000 in new revenue.

The increases are also designed to bring fishing license fees more in line with hunting fees. At present, the angler pays a substantially lower cost for his sport than the hunter.

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
