Three payments have been
made for the current fiscal
year, the superintendent of
schools said. The total received
is around 70 percent of the amount
actually due, he estimated.

Supt. Harrison stated that he
was not at all certain what im-
mediate benefits, if any, school
districts in the state might de-
rive as a result of the action
taken by the State Legislature
last week to ease the state's
financial crisis.
