Clarenceville Citizens' Comm. Meets Monday

Members of the newly organized Citizens' Committee for the Future Building of the Clarenceville School District met Monday night to make plans for future school needs.

According to conservative estimates, an increase of at least 50 percent in Clarenceville school enrollment is expected in the next two years. This would mean about 700 additional pupils.

Based on these projections, the Board of Education and administration has been studying proposals relative to bonding and school construction in order to keep pace with this growth. The Citizens' Committee was organized to render assistance to school officials on this matter and to present the taxpayer's point of view.

Addition for Farm. Lumber

Work started this week on an addition and remodeling for Farmington Lumber Co., 32800 Grand River. Quite a change is planned.

The addition will go to the west of the present office and display rooms, will be 2,000 square feet in size, with a 40 foot frontage, one story in height.

Conrad A. Sullivan, general manager and secretary of the firm, says there will be a new front all the way across. The addition will contain display areas, and the present building will be remodeled considerably to tie in with the addition.

The interior will present a beamed wood effect, and many of today's new building materials will be consolidated into the display areas, to serve as permanent displays.

Farmington Lumber does a large business with builders and contractors, and has grown steadily. More than a year ago the second story of the present building on the street was remodeled into offices, and these will remain.

Denies That He Charged Hall With Getting Tickets 'Fixed'

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is a complete text of a prepared statement, dated December 18, 1959, and submitted to The Farmington Enterprise on Monday, Dec. 21, by Robert H. Nelson, Farmington Township Justice of the Peace.

In yesterday's edition of the Farmington Enterprise, on Page 8A, in an article commencing on Page 1, it was stated that on Saturday, December 12, I had charged that Supervisor Hall was using his political office to get tickets "fixed" for relatives and friends.

I did not make such a statement. What I said was that I had heard rumors of such "fixing" or special treatment from a Township Police Officer and had told the officer that such a matter was very serious and could take no action on such rumors.

I told the officer that if he was sure that tickets were being voided or cancelled at Police Headquarters without even reaching court, or that certain persons received favored treatment, he should make a list giving the ticket number, the date, name of the person charged, the charge, the officer involved and any disposition recorded on the ticket, and if he would bring that list to me, I would take it to a member of the Township Board.

I also stated that this man said that Mr. Hall had told him that he could not do anything for him, but that Mr. Hall also told him he would see what he could do, whereupon the Township Attorney assured the Court that Mr. Hall had refused to permit the continuation of any remarks concerning a person who was not there to hear the charges against him. The above items are not sufficient to charge Supervisor Hall with using his political office to get tickets "fixed" for relatives and friends, and I did not make such a charge. I brought out the above items at the December 12 meeting in conjunction with data about my campaign promises and the recent attacks on Justices of the Peace.

My purpose in doing so was to present a background picture which might help explain why my efforts to run a proper court of law involved an emphasis on court dignity and on quality before the law.

THE PROPOSED new setup for single-family residential areas and for five lot sizes as follows:

24,000 sq. ft.	100x200
15,000 sq. ft.	80x185
13,000 sq. ft.	80x185
12,500 sq. ft.	80x156
7,200 sq. ft.	60x120

Under the proposed new plan some 50 square miles would be zoned to the highest minimum. As zoned now the ultimate township population is estimated at 144,000 to 150,000. Under the new lot sizes the ultimate population is estimated at 130,000 to 135,000.

BASIC in the thinking of the planning board is the fact that all neighborhoods would be able to support their own elementary schools, and that no pupils would have to walk more than half a mile.

These are some of the main points being considered in the tentative rezoning plans now being presented to the township board. The developers' suggestions would receive careful consideration in the final plan to be presented the township board.

As in all zoning changes, there will be a public meeting called where everyone can give reasons for or against changes. And the plan presented to the township board can be changed by it before final adoption.

But when this project is completed within the next several months, Farmington township will have a revised zoning ordinance which will undoubtedly govern the kind of growth it enjoys for many years to come.

north of Orchard street. But, no large development is likely.

Councilmen in talking about the future indicated they felt an obligation now to develop the small parking tract back of Hinkle's, as originally planned. This is the small parcel bought some time ago from John Laiz.

CITY OFFICIALS will also get together with the development committee which had worked out the special assessment district now dropped, to see if there is any possibility of a plan for other public parking.

It has been proposed earlier to develop a lot north of the Grand River downtown stores, and enlarge the present city metered lot south of Grand River and west of Farmington Road. This would have to be done under special assessment districts, with nearby property, paying at least, most of the costs.

could not be thrown from a car, truck, or blown from any load.

Handbills of any kind could not be thrown, deposited or sold anywhere, except a non-commercial handbill to any person willing to accept it. No handbills could be placed in or on any vehicle, unless a person therein would accept it. Nor could handbills be left at inhabited places, although there is an exemption for mail and newspapers.

PARTICULARLY is the ordinance designed to penalize those people who throw their own litter on nearby or vacant property, or even litter their own property in such a way as to be objectionable.

Even if a person's vacant land is littered by others, the city could serve notice on anyone that it must be cleaned up, and if nothing is done the city could clean it up and charge the owner for the work, including interest.

The ordinance at present contemplates that a person convicted of a misdemeanor under the ordinance could be fined up to \$50 or be imprisoned for up to 90 days, or both. Each day such violation would be permitted to continue would constitute a separate offense.
