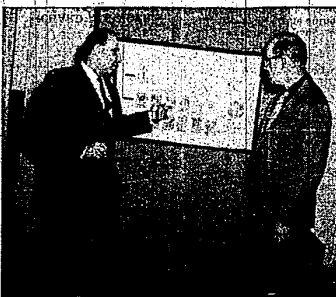

Seek More Big Brothers In The Farmington Area

This week, January 10-17, is officially being observed as Big Brother Week by Big Brothers of America.

The annual observance held to inform the general public about the Big Brother movement seeks to find more Big Brothers in the Farmington area, according to William L. Clark, Big Brothers Director.

The Big Brothers of Oakland County for five years has been helping to find adult men to be Big Brothers for boys between the ages of seven and sixteen who are fatherless or lack the guidance which a father should provide. The agency is non-denominational.

All Big Brothers are volunteers under the supervision of a professional staff of the local Big Brother agency. Clark pointed out that the principle of the Big Brother movement is the application of "one man to one boy" relationship to the treatment of boys who have problems. A Big Brother gives fully of himself to guide and be a friend to a boy with problems. Becoming a Big Brother involves careful screening, complete training and then the careful selection of a boy with like interests.

With the counsel of a professional social worker always at hand, the Big Brother builds a close and meaningful friendship with the boy. "We are in desperate need of at least 25 Big Brothers throughout Oakland County. We have boys waiting," stated Clark. Any man interested in finding out more about the program is urged to call us at Federal 5-9874 now.

Big Brothers of Oakland County is supported by the United Foundation of Detroit. William Sheehan, radio newsman, who recently accompanied President Eisenhower on his 22,000-mile goodwill tour, will share some of his experiences Sunday, Jan. 17, at the Farmington Universalist Church. He will speak at the 11 a.m. service, and the church's regular discussion group and midweek programs will be held at 10 a.m. Sunday school classes for nursery through high school will be in session from 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

Sheehan, who is now director of radio station WJR, was sent on the tour by the Consumers Power Co. and was the only privately-sponsored reporter in the group with the President. Scholarships offered by Cranbrook for the 1958-59 academic year at Cranbrook Institute, a college preparatory school for boys in Bloomfield Hills, Mich. Applications are due March 1. Any boy may apply for a grant if he is eligible for entrance into grades 7 through 11 next September. Inquiries should be addressed to the Director of Scholarships, Cranbrook School, Bloomfield Hills, Mich.

Candidates should have an above academic record, good citizenship, leadership qualities, and a proven need for financial aid. A boarding and day school, Cranbrook enrolls 700 students from all over the United States and several foreign lands. The school is one of six Cranbrook Institutions, a non-profit educational center located on 300 acres 10 miles northwest of Detroit.

While there is no fixed number or size of grants to be made, at present more than 10 percent of Cranbrook's students receive financial assistance.
