### Mrs. R. Nixon To Be Oakland Visitor Feb. 15

Mrs. Richard M. Nixon, the nation's "second lady," will be a guest of Oakland County Republicans at a reception February 15. It was announced by Arthur G. Elliott, Jr., County Chairman.

No details on the affair are available as yet.

Mrs. Nixon's visit to Oakland, sponsored by the Royal Oak Republican Women's Club in cooperation with the newly established Oakland County Council of Republican Women's Clubs, will make her only stop in Michigan.

Vice President Nixon is scheduled to speak in Detroit at a morning meeting sponsored by the Detroit Committee for the Eastern Colleges and at an Economic Club luncheon. In the afternoon, when her husband is clothed with State party leaders, Mrs. Nixon will greet an expected several hundred persons gathered to honor her in Oakland.

News of Mrs. Nixon's acceptance of the Royal Oak Club's invitation spread quickly throughout the county party organization. "Naturally, we are very excited about this," enthused Elliott. 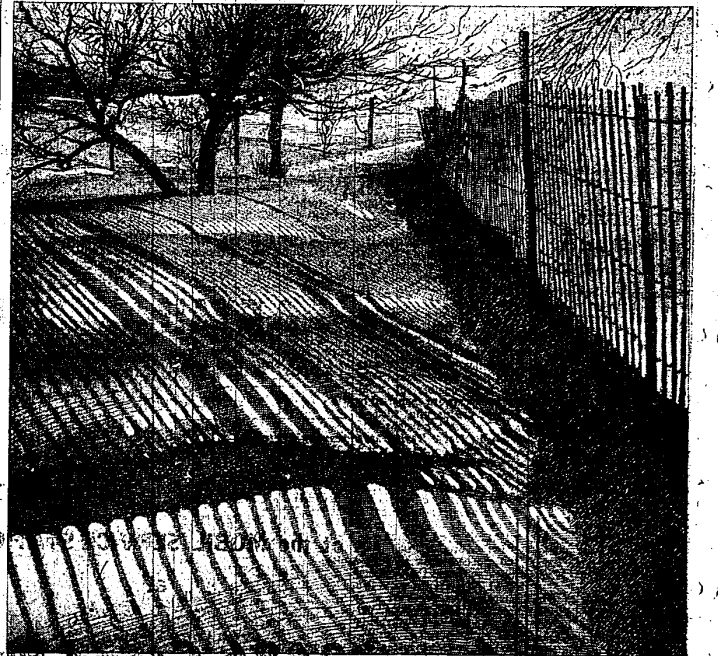
