Park Rules to Control Dogs

The Conservation Department's proposed new set of park rules and regulations encountered no opposition by a handful of persons who attended a formal public hearing in Lansing last week.

A major item in the set of rules is a measure which would require dogs to be under immediate control on beaches not exceeding six feet from May 1 through September 30. In addition, it would authorize parks personnel to evict persons whose dogs create a nuisance or disturbance. Bathing beach areas would continue to be off limits for dogs.

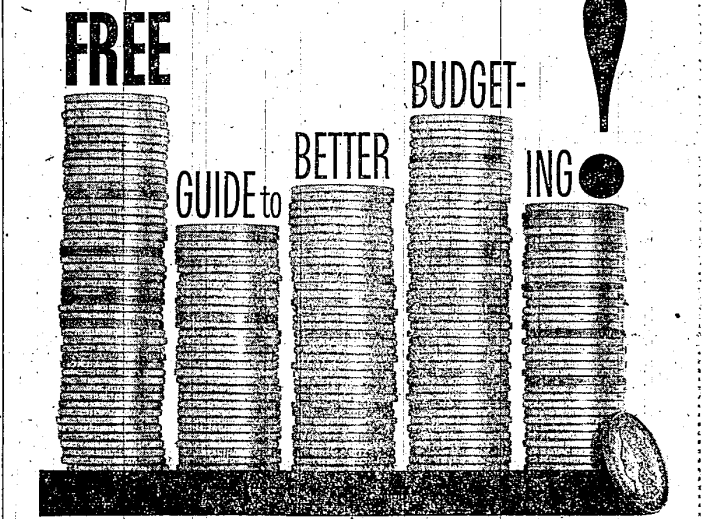
