Get Turkey Chilled Fast

Off the table and into the refrigerator or freezer for the left-over turkey. Home economists at Michigan State University say turkey shouldn't be left standing in a warm kitchen long after dinner is over. Quick chilling is recommended for handling the cooked meat. If you plan to freeze some of the turkey, process it as soon as you can. Just enough meat for one meal is a good package size to use. Have a moisture-proof, vapor-proof wrapping. Freeze turkey packed without gravy can be served in sandwiches, in turkey salad, or in turkey chop suey. Turkey may tend to be dry if frozen without gravy, so you may want to use it in a dish where a spread or a sauce gives added moisture. The storage life of most frozen prepared foods is short, so plan to use the leftover turkey within a week or two.

Threat of Suit On NW Hwy Interests Area

Farmington township residents are watching with interest a power play by an Oakland county group designed to force State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie to extend Northwestern Highway beyond the township line and across the county as an expressway. Mackie announced some time ago that he would use the \$25,000,000 bond issue money sold in May 1957 to extend Northwestern Highway as a four-lane limited access highway only as far as far as Telegraph Road, about a four mile stretch. This would leave the western end, which terminates in Farmington township, just as it is, ending at Orchard Lake Road.

THE GROUP of Northwestern Oakland county residents is represented by attorney Harry D. Wise, Jr. He has written Attorney Gen. Paul L. Adams to bring "legal proceedings" forcing Mackie to begin construction on the project as planned by former Commissioner Charles M. Siegler, Republican.

Wise says that if Adams does not take action, he himself will bring suit in circuit court. THE DISPUTE centers around the original plans to create a \$50 million, 10-mile extension of Northwestern as a limited access expressway from the Detroit city limits at 8 Mile to the Pontiac expressway (US-23) in Livingston county. The bond issue for half this amount was sold to raise funds for right-of-way purchase and initial construction. WISE CLAIMS that according to contracts signed at that time, the Highway Department, State Administrative Board and Oakland county together agreed to extend Northwestern to US-23. In December 1957 Mackie started Oakland county by announcing he did not intend to complete the expressway as originally planned, and the new plan was divulged. He claims it is within the framework of the agreement with the bondholders, and that any attempt to upset it will be useless. AT THE SAME TIME Mackie refused this plan, saying it was in the Detroit area, which included construction of the Walter P. Chrysler expressway from downtown Detroit to link eventually with Flint. This got priority.

Construction of the Chrysler project already has started in Detroit, and highway department land buyers have been acquiring right-of-way sites for it between Pontiac and Flint. What will happen to Northwestern Highway is problematical, but it will make interesting discussion in Farmington township for years to come.

BAKED APPLES

Bake an apple that keeps its shape. Says Detroit 2nd Best in Accessibility

The recent opening of a new five-mile, \$40-million section of the Edsel Ford Expressway in Detroit and Harper Woods has made Detroit "the second most accessible city in the world to major vehicles," State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said.

Mackie told an expressway dedication audience that the road combined with other operating sections of the Fordland John C. Lodge Expressways gave Detroit 23 miles of operating expressway within its corporate limits, second only to Los Angeles. He added that Detroit's accessibility was unique in that both the Ford and Lodge "penetrate the core area of the city."

"This achievement is an interesting but ironic contrast with some of the adverse national publicity Michigan has received during the past few months," Mackie said. "Legislative failure to agree on a state program to meet the state's general fund obligations is a subject of national ridicule as well as local dismay," he said. Yet at the same time today's dedication offers potent proof that we are a vigorous and growing state and Detroit is indeed a dynamic city."

Wins Promotion At Ford Motor
