CFM Group to Meet Saturday

Officers of 101 local chapters of Citizens For Michigan from all over the state will meet with statewide study group leaders at Ann Arbor, Saturday, Feb. 20 as part of the organization's speeded-up program for dealing with crucial state issues in time for the 1963 political campaign.

Dr. Ralph W. Conant, executive director of CFM, said the Ann Arbor conference will provide orientation and guidance on selected top-priority issues so that the lengthy process of fact-finding and development of recommendations may get underway immediately throughout the state.

George Romney, state chairman, will open the meeting with a discussion of the method the citizen's group plans to use in reconciling diverse viewpoints among informed citizens, and arriving at an effective consensus that will command widespread support.

"Both statewide study committees and local chapters must have the opportunity to review and debate the facts involved in Michigan's political and economic problems, and time for sufficient reflection and debate on solutions," Conant said.

Region Seven to Convene Oct. 28

Region Seven (Oakland County) of the Michigan Education Association will hold its annual fall conference October 28 in Detroit.

The annual workshops, sponsored by the MEA in cooperation with the Michigan department of public instruction, are designed to improve the teachers' knowledge of educational trends and progress and to provide in-service training.

Last fall more than 3500 teachers and administrators attended the Region Seven conference.

Michigan is one of the few states in the country that sponsor such conferences.
