Mrs. Mildred E. Bennett, Red Cross executive director, said the volunteers would be specially trained Red Cross Gray Ladies, destined for service at the hospital in general nursing, clerical duties, baggy shop operation, geriatrics care, respiration therapy, and occupational therapy.

INTERVIEWING of prospective volunteers will be scheduled February 19-25 at the Red Cross Chapter House, 118 E. Franklin Blvd., Pontiac. Call GR. 4-3575 or LI. 2-6700 for an appointment.

The program will be under the supervision of Mrs. George M. Schmitt, Red Cross volunteer coordinator at Pontiac State. Mrs. William C. Sproul, County Red Cross Gray Lady volunteer, and Red Cross volunteer coordinator for the Hospital.

According to Mrs. Bennett, training of volunteers will begin Friday, February 26, at 1 p.m. at the Red Cross Chapter House, with succeeding sessions scheduled from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. at the Pontiac State Hospital Auditorium. A total of 14 hours of training is planned.

Following training, the Gray Ladies will select the area of service which best fits their interests.

Included in the training will be discussions led by: Dr. Hubert Miller, Director of the Out-Patient Clinic; Dr. Phyllis Hursey, resident psychiatrist; Richard Luchman, Director of personnel; Richard Arthaud, Director of Psychiatric Social psychiatric aide; Miss Dorothy Roe, Director of Recreational Therapy; and Mrs. Eleanor McCarty, Director of Occupational Therapy, all of the Pontiac State Hospital staff.

THE RED CROSS presently has 37 Gray Ladies volunteering at Pontiac State Hospital.

"The Hospital has asked us to expand our service there," Mrs. Schmitt explained. "With the 100 new volunteers, this will be one of the most comprehensive volunteer programs ever organized in a mental institution, certainly in Oakland County."

"This is for you," Says Mrs. Sproul, "if you want to help the mentally ill, if you want to learn about mental health, if you want to help your neighbors in a most constructive way, call for an appointment for an interview."

## Baptist Church Guest Speaker Is Dr. Jacques

Guest speaker at the First Baptist Church on Sunday, February 21, 11:15 a.m., will be Dr. Edwin E. Jacques, mission executive, world traveler and former missionary.

Foreign secretary for the Central Baptist Foreign Mission Society of Wheaton, Illinois, Dr. Jacques has made two trips to survey the fields in Europe and Asia for which he is responsible. These include Italy, Portugal, India, West Pakistan, Taiwan, Japan, Philippine Islands and Ceylon.

DR. JACQUES has had missionary experience in Albania and Italy. He served in India from 1932 to 1940, when the Italian Revolution led to a cessation of mission work. Returning to the United States with his family, he held pastorates at Graton and Fitchburg, Massachusetts, in 1950 he returned to the mission field, this time to Italy to work with CBFMS.

During his five years of missionary service in India, Dr. Jacques established a Bible center in Naples to help meet the need for Bibles, tracts, gospel portions and Christian support.

Since his inception in 1945, Dr. Jacques' ministry was in promoting a Bible correspondence course on the book of John.

CBFMS has grown rapidly since its inception in 1945. At present the society has over 370 missionaries on 13 fields and is supported by more than 1500 Baptist churches in this country.
