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Notice of Special Election Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a Special Election of the qualified electors of the aforesaid School District will be held in the Clarenceville High School, formerly known as Clarenceville High School, located at 20217 Middlebelt Road in said School District, on Monday, March 21, 1960, and at such Special Election the following propositions will be submitted to the qualified electors of the School District:

PROPOSITION I: Bonding Proposition

Shall Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Eight Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$850,000.00) and issue its bonds therefor, for the purpose of paying the cost of additions to existing buildings, of erecting new school buildings, of furnishing and equipping the same, and of making improvements to existing school sites?

PROPOSITION II: Reclassification Proposition

Shall Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, be reclassified and become a school district of the third class?

PROPOSITION III: Operating Millage Increase Proposition

Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes, which may be assessed against all property in Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, for all purposes except payment of obligations incurred before December 3, 1932, be increased as provided by Section 21, Article X of the Constitution of Michigan, by two-tenths of one per cent (2 mills) of the assessed valuation, as equalized, of all property in the school district for a period of one (1) year, 1960, and seven-tenths of one per cent (7 mills) of the assessed valuation, as equalized, of all property in the school district for a period of five (5) years, 1961 to 1965, both inclusive, to be used exclusively for the purpose of paying operational expenses of said school district?

The polls of election will be open from 7:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M., Eastern Standard Time.

Each person voting on the proposition to increase the total tax rate limitation (millage increase) and to reclassify the School District to a Third Class District must be a citizen of the United States, above the age of twenty-one (21) years, and have resided in the State of Michigan six (6) months, and in the School District thirty (30) days next preceding the day of election. Each person voting on the proposition of borrowing money and issuing bonds, in addition to the preceding qualifications, must be the owner of property assessed for taxes within the School District or the lawful husband or wife of such owner.

Only registered voters are eligible to vote.

TAKE NOTICE that with reference to Proposition I, the Board of Education has estimated that Eight Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$850,000.00) is the amount of money necessary to be borrowed for the purposes above mentioned, all of which it is necessary to borrow by means of said bond issue.

Sarah Fisher Home Has Increased All Services

The annual report of most corporations is normally filled with financial statistics, but the annual report of the St. Vincent and Sarah Fisher Home for Children is filled with service and the kind hearts of your neighbors.

SISTER ROSE Marie, administrator of the 60 acres of schools, cottages and playgrounds, points out that this Farmington unit of the Daughters of Charity "Importantly increased all of its services during 1959."

But the Sisters had plenty of help from local and Detroit area volunteer groups which contributed both funds and personal assistance. These included the United Community Services, Catholic Social Services, Ladies of Charity, Seton Guild, Milk Fund Association, Junior League of Catholic Women and Girl Sisters.

Members of these organizations spent 5,078 hours in aiding activities and programs of the Home. This is a marked increase from the 3,971 hours of the previous year, "and is most appreciated by the staff and the 400 children who were cared for in 1959," Sister said.

SHE EXPLAINED the Home's primary purpose is to provide a temporary residence (from three months to two years) for children who for various reasons must live away from their own homes.

"Key point here," Sister emphasized, "is that children, of one family can be placed together."

The Home also includes complete psychological and medical services for the children, provided by both staff members and additional professional people and technicians.

Sister Rose Marie, in summing up her report, expressed "confidence that the Home will further increase service to children in 1960," and a desire to "see and work with more of our Farmington neighbors."

SISTER SAID 1960 is the centenary of the death of St. Vincent de Paul and St. Louise de Marillac, founders of the Daughters of Charity and the Sisters of the Mission, who died in 1600.

The Home is located on 12 Mile Road at Inkster Street.
