Education Cost Is Up Sharply

It costs 87 per cent more to educate one student in Michigan public schools today than it did 30 years ago, Thomas J. Northey, of the Michigan Education Association's Research Division reported.

A survey of expenditures per pupil by the MEA revealed that in 1927-28 \$321 was spent on each elementary and secondary pupil in the state. In 1957-58 the total was \$597.50.

FIGURES compiled by Northey include money spent on operation, which includes the salaries of teachers, principals, and other personnel, instructional, operational money, maintenance, fixed charges and auxiliary charges.

The per cent of increase in cost per pupil has declined each year since 1953-54, when the biggest hike was recorded. Per pupil expenditure in 1955-56 was almost 10 per cent greater than in 1954-55.
