Salem Teens Rehearse For Good Friday Program
A cast of teenagers, members of the Youth Fellowship of Salem United Church of Christ, are in rehearsal of a hard hitting play, "The Case of Humpty vs. Pontius Pilate" and the modern court scene at Salem Church in Farmington.
BILL CLAYTON, as Pontius Pilate stands trial for his crime of ordering the crucifixion of Jesus. The verdict is left to the heads of the jurors who are chosen from the spectators. The time is the present and the setting is modern; the events are re-examined as if they happened only yesterday, with every attempt being made to present both sides of the "case" as accurately as possible.
The prosecuting attorney, Bob Bennett, and defense attorney, Benjamin Clayton, are both one point after another during the swift and heated cross examination. We see faith, greed, vanity and hope come in conflict. The people most intimately involved in history's greatest story.

Rev. Kellison to Review Book
The idea that "the religion of America is Democracy, with George Washington, Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln as its saints or high priests" will be advanced from the pulpit of the Farmington Universalist Church Sunday, March 20, at the 11 a.m. service. In his sermon, the Rev. Walter B. Kellison will review a book by Martin E. Marty, "The New Shape of American Religion," which he said, "summarizes American religious revivals and shows how they have blurred the cutting edge of the line into a religion of accommodation." Mr. Kellison said the author quotes a well-known actress "who believes in everything - a little bit" as typical of many toward religious faith. Marty is an associate editor of the magazine "Christian Century".

Service Shows Power of Faith
The power of faith, raised to spiritual understanding, will be emphasized at Christian Science services Sunday.
Mark's account of the healing of the epileptic boy will be read, concluding with Christ Jesus' words (9:29): "This kind can come forth by nothing but by prayer and fasting." The subject of the Lesson-Sermon is "Matter."
"Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy will include this (23:16): "Faith, if it be mere belief, is as a pendulum swinging between nothing and something, having no fixity. Faith, advanced to spiritual understanding, is the evidence gained from Spirit, which rebukes sin of every kind and establishes the claims of God."
The Golden Text is 1 Peter Colossians (3:2): "Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth."
