ture of the entire student body at the school in town in 1916. Showing its years of wear, this picture (supplied by Mrs. Henrietta Habermehl of 33209 Oakland) did not reproduce as well as we would have liked it to. Maybe with a magnifying glass and a little

eye straining, however, some-olddimers will be able to identify some of the youngsters. Identification of even some for the historical records would be helpful.

Registrations Reach 312,318 in County

Annual motor registration figures issued this week by James M. Hare, Secretary of State, showed that 312,318 motor vehicles of all types were registered in Oakland County on which \$5,013,599.82 in taxes were collected. These included 258,163 passenger cars and 24,845 trucks and commercial vehicles.

Total receipts for all motor vehicle activities, but not including gas and diesel fuel taxes, totaled \$71,590,087.00 in 1959, a \$3,608,057.82 increase over 1958's \$67,985,029.20.

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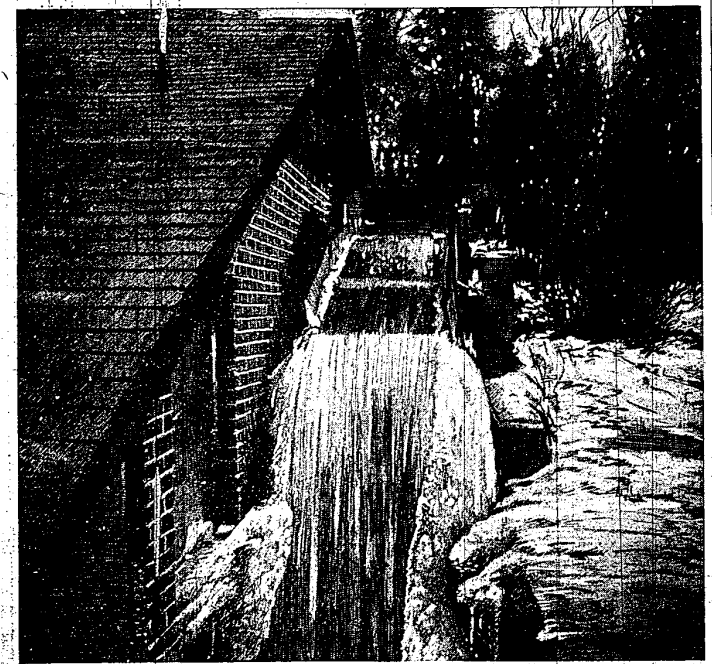


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
