The Farmington Players has chosen John Patrick's comedy, "The Hasty Heart," as its next production. It will open Friday, May 6th, 1960 and will be given again on Saturday, May 14th, 1960 and the following weekend on Friday, May 13, and Saturday, May 14th, 1960.

Described as "a comedy about a tragedy," "a war play which is not about the war," the play is set in a British hospital in Burma and depicts the conflict between a bitter, lonely young Scottish sergeant and his fellow patients who try to give him the friendship which he wants but which he does not know how to accept. The soldier learns how to take and to give friendship for the first time in his isolated life, he discovers that he is afflicted with a disease from which he must inevitably die in a few weeks, and thus he believes the friendship that has been offered him has been only pity.

According to all advance reports the atmosphere of the play is not sombre, but is that of a heartwarming comedy. When it began its successful run in New York it was called "profoundly moving but also one of the merriest pieces of Broadway."

This play has already been cast and the actors are busy mastering Scottish, Cockney, Australian and American Southern accents. The cast calls for eight men and one woman.

AAUW Award Fellowships To 43 Women

Fellowships totaling over \$115,800 have been awarded for scholarly research in the liberal arts and sciences during 1960 by the American Association of University Women Educational Foundation. Mrs. Clarence Stoll is chairman of the Fellowship Committee of the Farmington Branch. Libraries, laboratories and as well as a government office, union offices, and an Indian reservation, will yield answers to studies that the scholars hope will add significantly to the store of knowledge in their field.

The 43 American women who were accepted by the Association of fellowships were selected from among 184 applicants. The fellowships awarded range from \$200 to \$500 with more than half of them over \$300.

FUNDS FOR these awards are derived from yearly contributions of about \$50,000 from AAUW members throughout the country, which also provide international grants to some 30 women from other countries. Grants are also income derived from the more than 2 million dollar AAUW Endowment Fund. Dr. Ruth M. VanDe Kleet, a native of Grand Rapids, will study in the field of American literature at the University of Michigan and at Widener Library, Harvard University. She plans to prepare a book length study of the fiction of Rudyard Kipling, contemporary short story writer.
